Free land subsidies do not attract investors who seek a quicker return for their money than they would be likely to get out of lines that have to create settlement before getting freights. It is alsoffound that the mischievous effects of last year's agitation still linger. Mr. Stephen is constantly confronted with exaggerated accounts of the secession movement, agents of land grant roads in the States having made the most of the cries raised by 'the political farmers. Neverthless it is believed the money necessary to extend the Southwestern to Whitewater will be forthcoming, though just now it must be confessed it is not in sight.
