He had a hard and difficult field of labor, and there is hardly a doubt but that his faithfulness to his duties was the cause of his death. During the winter time—on account of the bad weather, which caused the streams to rise so that he could not use a conveyance—he has been known to walk several miles to the depot, wading through water in order to keep his appointments. The love of Christ constrained him to work as long as he could. For some time before his death he was unable to officiate. He bore his sufferings patiently, until at last he received his summons to exchange a life of suffering for one of joy and peace. He rests from his labors.
