We would also like to know whether the minister proposes to launch a drive against fishing and fisheries as his colleague, the Minister of National Health and Welfare (Miss LaMarsh), did against the use of cigarettes?

Mr. Speaker: Would the hon. member put this important question on the order paper.

Mr. Lloyd R. Crouse (Queens-Lunenburg): On a point of order, Mr. Speaker, I believe that the import of this question is of such a nature and of such great importance to a vast number of people in one of the primary industries of Canada that, with great deference to you, sir, it should not be placed on the order paper, but that if the Minister of Fisheries is in a position to make a reply of some nature at this time he should now do SO.
