The Mandate of the (French) King to the Sieur Chevalier de Fenquiere, Governor and Lieutenant General of the Windward Islands in America.

"IT IS Majesty having been informed that the King of England has given the "Islands of St. Vincent, and St. Lucia, to the " Duke of Montagu; has made his Com-" plaint of it in England, and has alledged that neither the one, nor the other of those " Islands belong to that Crown: The first of " them ought to remain to the Carribees, ac-" cording to Conventions made with that " People, and the second belongs to France; " who has been willing to suspend the Settlement of that Island, on the Request * of the King of England. Notwithstanding these Reasons, his Majesty bas not been informed, that there has been any Revocation of this "Grant. On the contrary, he understands " that the Duke of Montagu, is preparing to " fend and take Possession of those Islands, " and to transport Numbers of Families thi-" ther. This Undertaking being contrary to " the Rights of his Majesty, his Intention is. " that in Case the English should take Posses-
