notwithstanding there was in portthen, exclusive of his fleet, seventeen of the line and thirteen frigates ready for fea, and eleven of the line and nineteen frigates fitting: great part of which might also have been sent with him: for there was no armament at that time at Brest or Rochfort, but that defigned for Canada: nor was there any neceffity to keep one fourth of them at home to oppose any armament in the French ports upon the Channel; for there was not one man of war in them, and by authentic accounts, no more Prips or boats of all nations at Dunkirk, Graveline, Calais, and Boulogne, than could possibly transport more than 6000 men, nor at Havre and Dicppe no more than common; nor was there at any one time during the alarm of an invalion, any more shipping, or any preparations for an embarkation, except measuring the vessels to know how many men they would carry. So that the danger of an invasion cannot excuse the long neglect of Minorca, no: the fending of to insufficient a force at last.

That it appears that the squadron of his Majesty's ships in the Mediterranean in the beginning of December 1755 consisted of one ship of 60, two of 50 guns, four frigates and one sloop and no more, and that the garrison of Fort St. Philip, in the said month of December according to the last returns made on the 31st of July 1755 consisted of 2860 men, officers included, and no more, and that after that time no ship
