Joe Bricker broke the pole vault record when he did 11 feet 2 inches, the former mark being 10 feet 10 inches, made by H. Duke. Mel Brock won the half and quarter-mile runs in handy style.

The Guelph College boys showed up well in the distance events, and Fraser finished the three-mile run with an exceptional burst of speed.

M'GILL ATHLETES EXPECT TO DEFEAT VARSITY MEN

Three Records, Including One by J. B. Morrow, Beaten at McGill's Class Games.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20.—The annual inter-class games of McGill University took place to-day at the M.A.A. grounds. The student body turned out practically en masse to witness the events as the team to participate in the annual Canadian inter-collegiate championships is chosen from those who take places in the inter-class games.

The afternoon was featured by the breaking of three college records and the equalling of two more. Students from the Maritime Provinces started, J. J. McDougall, a sophomore from Cape Breton, won all three weight events, discus, hammer and shot-put, and in each hung up a new mark. Stanley, a runner from Prince Edward Island, won the quarter, equaling the time made by the Reverend J. D. Monaghan, another Prince Edward Islander, won both the high jump and pole vault and in the latter event J. Smith, from the same province, took the most commplace work.

On the whole the performances were remarkably good and the students confidently predict that when the old rivals from the University of Toronto when the two teams come together.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 20.—(Midnight).—As the night advanced rain, which had fallen intermittently all day, increased, making it practically certain that the fourth of the series between the New York Giants and the Athletics, scheduled for this city to-morrow, would be again postponed.
