They have already signed a full team, with several to spare, and have lines out for a couple more good men. A well-known lacrosse expert gave out on good authority yesterday the following as their probable line-up: Gibbons, goal; Harshaw, point; Braden, Davidson, corner; Powers, Zickler, Marshall, defence; West or Dandeno, centre; Springs, Turnoult, Fitzgerald, home; Kall, outside; Warwick, inside; McGlashan (St. Catharines), Warren (Woodbridge), Spellen (Maitland), spare.

Charles Querre is having his troubles getting his bunch rounded out. McGregor will go to the coast. Fred Graydon is looking out for himself, and McGlashan is not yet signed, and it is doubtful whether he will be able to live up to his reputation as a player. The team-mate, McGregor.
