OTTAWA. Dec. 24.—The last will and testament of the late Sir Richard Cartwright was admitted to probate in the Carleton Surrogate Court by Judge Gunn here. The total assets are placed at \$228,392.80, while liabilities are stated to be at least \$155,000. No details of the latter are given.

They will contain the following declaration by affidavit:

"The debts of the said deceased and incumbrances against his estate will

incumbrances against his estate will amount to at least \$155,000, and after deducting the same the gross value of the property subject to succession duty will not be in excess of \$80,000.
