WHEAT CUTTING IN SASKATCHEWAN

Decrease is shown in the Quantity of New Breaking of Ground. HARVEST NEXT WEEK

Reports of Rust Shake Confidence of Farmers in Brandon District.

Regina, July 29.—Wheat cutting has commenced in many parts of Saskatchewan, according to reports received from correspondents of the bureau of statistics of the provincial department of agriculture.

Early shown rye has been threshed near Fort Qu'Appelle, yielding twenty-five bushels per acre.

From reports received from crop experts it is estimated there is a 27 per cent. decrease in the amount of the new breaking compared with that of 1918, the amount being: 1918, 614,990 acres, and 1919, 447,112 acres.

It is gratifying to note that the amount of land summer fallowed shows a slight increase amounting to three per cent. and the percentage is small, the total increase amounting to no less than 151,089 acres.

The average under summer fallow in 1918 was 4,891 while the acreage this year is 4,215,790.

Damage From Rust. Brandon, Man., July 29.—Reports of rust and samples of rusted wheat are shaking the confidence of the wheat farmers in the Brandon district in their optimistic belief that the wheat average in this district will be between 18 and 20 bushels to the acre.

Individual fields located in all points of the compass with Brandon as the hub, show damage from rust, in some instances, reaching the yield estimate for the fields affected from 25 bushels an acre to chicken feed only.

This refers particularly to the wheat, a great deal of which will be ready for the binder this week, and this is undamaged.

C. B. Sinkballe's farm at Kinnear, west of Brandon, has a 75-acre field that was summer fallowed last year. The wheat appears excellent to a passerby, but the owner who looked for 25 bushels to the acre now estimates he will have chicken feed if he cuts it.

North of Brandon a great deal of the late wheat is seriously affected. Early crops, however, are safe. Oats and barley are poor.

From the east, the reports are more reassuring. There is rust, but there are no late crops of wheat, oats or barley. Two farmers in that district started cutting on Monday, and both are well satisfied with the quality and the yield.

Winnipeg Grain Exchange Stops Futures Trading. Wheat Market Will Remain Closed Until Further Instructions Are Received.

Winnipeg, July 29.—Somewhat of a sensation was sprung on the grain market this morning when instructions were received by President F. J. Anderson of the grain exchange from Sir Geo. E. Foster, minister of trade and commerce, Ottawa, to withdraw immediately all facilities for trading in wheat futures.

This was done at once, or a few minutes after the opening of the markets and before any buying or selling had been consummated, although several bids had been received at prices higher for October delivery and one offer for December than yesterday's closing quotations.

Wheat Market Closes. The grain exchange council held a meeting at 10.30 this morning to consider the matter, but in the absence of any further news from Ottawa, it was found impossible to take any further action, and the wheat market was closed until further instructions are received.

Advance Has Been Steady. After being closed for nearly two years, the wheat market was permitted to be re-opened on Monday, July 28, and after seven days of trading, prices had advanced to 48¢ per bushel, the highest since the opening of the market, the opening price being 32.20, and closing on Monday, July 28, at 42.45.

The advance has been steady, and prices being made daily. It was common rumor on the exchange that the demand for wheat was coming from American interests only.

Providing the Dominion government decided to fix a minimum price and closed market for wheat, it is regarded as probable that the wheat export companies for which our standards of it will be appointed to purchase and handle this year's crop.

This company represents the British and allied governments during the past two years, and purchased all wheat and flour supplied for the government.

The Telegram today says: "It is stated on very high authority that James Stewart, president of the Grain Exchange Company, has been appointed grain director for Canada, with sole power to purchase and sell this year's wheat crop."
