

INDUCTION AT ST. THOMAS'  
CONDUCTED BY ARCHBISHOP

Rev. C. Ensor Sharp Installed as  
Rector—Sermon by Arch-  
deacon Sweeney.

"And be thou in all things a part-  
ner to the rock committed to thy  
care."

With these solemn words, Arthur,  
Lord Archbishop of Toronto, gave to  
Rev. C. Ensor Sharp a Bible and Book  
of Common Prayer, and duly and cer-  
emoniously invested him with the rec-  
torship of St. Thomas Church.

The mandate of induction was read  
and the churchwarden presented the  
keys of the church to the new rector,  
who replied: "I receive these keys as  
pledges of my induction as your ap-  
pointed minister, and I, on my part, do  
promise, by God's help, to be a faith-  
ful shepherd over you, and to be a faith-  
ful minister of the Gospel of the Son, and  
of the Holy Ghost, Amen."

Then, before a church full of wit-  
nesses, and a host of surprised clergy,  
archbishops in red and choristers in black,  
with the seven red lights, and the two  
candlesticks burning before the altar,  
with organ pealing, and the church  
triumphant embellished in many  
forms, the rector, kneeling, said:  
"The church steps, was instituted  
amid much pomp and splendor.  
The Rev. C. Ensor Sharp is an  
M. A. of Cambridge University, and al-  
so of Trinity College, Toronto. He  
comes to Toronto after splendid ser-  
vice in the rectorship of Eglwist,  
British Columbia.

Archdeacon Sweeney preached the  
sermon, taking as his text, "Paul, a  
servant of Jesus Christ, called to be  
an apostle, separated unto the Gospel  
of God, Romans, I, 1."

Reminding his flock that the day  
had a dual significance as the celebra-  
tion of St. Paul's conversion, and al-  
so the induction of a new rector, the  
archdeacon proceeded to outline  
very dramatically the life of St. Paul,  
from his boyhood days in the streets  
of Tarsus and the mountain slopes  
of Taurus, until, smitten by the vision  
upon the Damascus road, he became  
a servant of Jesus Christ.

Referring to the 33 years of service  
in the parish by their late rector, the  
archdeacon wished for his present occa-  
sion, a like lengthy and glowing ser-  
vice.

Conspicuous among the clergy in the  
chancel were: Rev. H. H. McCausland  
of St. Luke's, Rev. Mr. McCausland  
of St. Augustine's, Rev. Mr. Hartley,  
Canon Welch of St. James, Canon  
"Father" J. M. Davenport, Rev. Mr.  
Clark of St. Barnabas, Rev. Prof.  
Jencks of Trinity College, and Rev. A.  
Bryant of St. Thomas.
