James Saunders, of Embro, put a bullet through his foot while shooting.
Rev. W. Ames, of Woodstock, has been 82 years in the Methodist ministry.
It is estimated that \$60,000 worth of apples will be shipped from Goderich this year.
Rev. Carl B. Smith, the new incumbent of St. John's, Berlin, assumed his duties yesterday.
Mr. T. H. Race, of Mitchell, has been elected a director of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association.
Mr. W. Wigle, of Kingsville, who is 94 years of age, husked 50 1-2 bushels of corn one day lately.
A carload of bulls was shipped from the Lucknow station on Tuesday by Messrs. McLean & Young.
A Walkerton boy got a month in jail for stealing a Salvation Army poor box containing 5 cents.
A local company has been formed at Thamesville to bore for oil in the territory adjoining that village.
Some \$55 were collected in fees at the Stratford Collegiate Institute last term. There are 200 pupils on the roll.
Reeve McAustin, of Galt, received \$3 of consanguinity money the other day, with the information, "This belongs to you."
The Woodstock bred mare Princess, by Princeton—Roxaline, was sold at the Hurstbourne stud sale the other day for \$250. She is now 16 years old.
A number of Mount Forest ladies have organized a reading club as a means of enabling them to spend the winter afternoons and evenings in a profitable manner.
Mr. John McDonald did a good day's threshing for Mr. George Moffatt, 10th concession of Kinross—over 900 bushels of grain, the product of 50 acres on the latter's farm, being the result.
E. A. Cassey, of Stratford, in company with Mr. J. H. H. of Goderich, has been awarded a contract for four and a quarter miles of sewer work in Goderich. The figure is said to be under \$10,000.
Fred Mitchell, who was convicted of stealing a diamond pin from a man at the Windsor race track a few weeks ago, was on Saturday sentenced to eighteen months in the Central Prison by Magistrate Bartlett. He stole the

pin from the scarf of the man and then stuck it into the coat of an accomplice, who made his escape.

At a meeting of the shareholders of the Stratford Shoe Company, held on Thursday evening, the bylaw recently passed by the directors for a charter to increase the stock to \$25,000, was confirmed.

The bodies of Burroughs and Anderson, drowned at Port Burwell, had not been recovered up to Friday night. Old inhabitants at the Port say they never saw the lake so rough as on Thursday afternoon.

The Windsor Review, which was purchased a short time ago by J. H. Long, has again changed hands. It is now controlled by a joint stock company, J. H. Long and F. H. Macpherson holding a controlling interest.

Mr. John Eckmire, of Mitchell, had a narrow escape from being killed while out shooting the other day. While in the act of shooting at a black squirrel the gun exploded, but Mr. Eckmire came off with but a scratch or two.

Mr. Thomas Agar, who has lately carried on business in Chesley, and formerly of Ashfield, has purchased the comfortable brick residence belonging to Mr. D. B. Forster, of Lucknow, and intends being a resident of that village.

Hildred's carriage works, Lucknow, have been removed from Stauffer street to the new building just west of R. Proctor's harness shop. The Canadian shop which occupied part of the same building has also been removed and is now in T. Young's old stand.

Word was received in Woodstock on Friday of the death from suffocation of the infant daughter of Mr. Newton Cosh, cheesemaker at the Spring Creek factory, East Zorra. The baby was found lying on its face in a bed with the clothes wrapped around it, and expired soon afterwards.

George Whalls, engineer at the St. Thomas gas and electric light works, received a severe shock on Friday while at work. He was making a connection of the wire, when he received a shock of 500 volts from a live wire. He was knocked to the ground and badly stunned. The thumb of his right hand was severely burned.

Mr. Reid has been appointed a police officer for Windsor. The new officer has been a resident of that city for the past eight years, during which time he has been employed on the Canadian Pacific Railway. He worked on the road when it was under construction, and has always been a faithful employee. He is 34 years old and married.

A couple of weeks ago Hotel-keeper Hartick, of Thamesford, was fined \$30 and costs by Police Magistrate Morrison, of Ingersoll, for extending his bar into an adjoining room on fair day so as to increase his accommodation. The Liquor Dealers' Association took hold of the case and entered an appeal. The appeal came up before County Judge Finkle, who gave a decision quashing the conviction by the magistrate.

An almost incredible amount of plundering has been going on at Brantford since last Tuesday night, when Mr. S. Luke's stable was entered and a set of harness worth \$50 stolen. The same night the model school was entered and a number of valued framed pictures were taken. The vestry of Trinity Church was stripped of its furnishings, and from the Presbyterian Church a new sofa,

half a dozen choice chairs and quantities of dishes belonging to the ladies have also disappeared. Private property has also been stolen, consisting of a horse and wagon, a second set of harness and provisions from cellars. The council has offered a reward of \$50 for information that will lead to the conviction of the thieves.

Sarnia Observer: Mrs. Wm. Doherty, of Sarnia township, met with a distressing accident the other day. She was standing near a straw cutting machine that was at work, and attempted to adjust some of the straw that was being cut, with the result that the first two fingers of her right hand were drawn into the machine, and so lacerated that they had to be amputated.

A man named Daniel Ross, employed by Mr. Adams of West Oxford, was arrested Thursday afternoon by Chief Skirving and Assistant Cook, of Ingersoll, as a dangerous lunatic. For years he has threatened to kill people, and on one occasion, it is alleged, he attempted to cut a boy's throat with a case knife. On Sunday night he set fire to a five-roomed log house at Putnam, the property of Charles Small.

Sheriff Hossie met with a queer experience on Norman street, Stratford, Thursday night. In passing along the north side of Norman street he suddenly came in contact with a telephone wire that had been thrown by the wind. The wire caught the sheriff around the neck. William and Alfred Mowat, who were sitting in the car of the street and came to his assistance, and Mr. Cornwall, who lives near by, also came out, and they succeeded in extricating the sheriff and cut the wire.

The recent arrest and acquittal of W. Lemon, of Tilsonburg, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, will probably result in two actions for damages. A writ is to be issued against George Burke, of Tilsonburg, who prosecuted Lemon on the above charge, claiming damages for malicious prosecution, and a writ for \$2,000 for slander has already been issued against Ebenezer Cook, of South Norwich. Statements of claim have not yet been filed.

Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Campbell, who have resided for many years in Malden township, celebrated their golden wedding last week. They are both natives of Scotland, and when they came to this country they first lived at Windsor, but afterwards moved to the farm where they now reside. Mr. Campbell is 75 years old, and his wife is 76. Mr. Campbell has been identified with civic affairs in Malden for many years, having occupied the position of reeve, councillor, assessor, and has been treasurer for nineteen years.

Clachan's Sensation.**The Inquest on Mrs. Stewart's Body Began.****General Condition of the Body That of a Well-Preserved Woman.**

Clachan, Ont., Nov. 9.—The mystery surrounding the death of Mrs. A. C. Stewart, near Clachan village, deepens rather than otherwise. The inquest disclosed no cause of death apparent to the medical men who performed the autopsy. The organs were found to be normal, and the general condition of the body that of a healthy, well-preserved woman. The doctors are puzzled to account for her demise under the circumstances which accompanied it, namely, violent pains and vomiting, followed by coma, which lasted a whole day. Evidence of the woman having recently been in a delicate condition were not present. Police constable had caused the death, Dr. Fleming says, without leaving traces discoverable on superficial examination, for certain forms of poison do not disclose any pathological condition. But what was the motive for poisoning?" he asks. The intimacy between the deceased and a young man was not regarded by the doctor as solving the mystery, unless the woman had got into trouble thereby. Nor has it been shown that she was despondent prior to the illness which carried her off. The young man, McCarter, was sent for by the coroner, but failed to put in an appearance.

The body of the dead woman, which had been exhumed, was in a rather advanced state of decomposition, but not so much so as to interfere with the conduct of the autopsy, which was performed by Dr. Bell, assisted by Dr. Graham, and Dr. Fleming, of this city. A thorough examination of the remains was made, and the stomach and portions of the viscera were removed and sealed up. These will be sent to Toronto for analysis.

Dr. John L. Bray, of this city, conducted the inquest.

The following witnesses were called: Michael C. Dickson, John McIntyre, and wife, Mrs. Blume, Mrs. Grant, Mary Elizabeth Stewart, daughter of the deceased, Dr. Bell, Dr. Fleming, Dr. Graham.

Mr. Dickson's evidence bore the most directly on the case, from the standpoint of the woman's conduct and condition. He believed she was in a delicate condition and was taking medicine.

The other witnesses, saving those who spoke of the woman's illness, did not throw any light on the case, and even as to the illness, nothing that has not already been told was disclosed.

The medical men who performed the post-mortem presented their findings, stating that no cause of death was evident, except it might be a heart weakness that organ showing a trace of fatty degeneration. All the organs were in good state. Dr. Bell held to his impression of unnatural death. Dr. Graham was not disposed to state that death was due to unnatural causes.

An adjournment was taken for a fortnight to permit of a report being received from the public analyst as to whether poison had been taken by the deceased.

THREE DROWNED.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Nov. 7.—A fatal accident occurred near Old Forge, Pa. J. McCarthy, of Scranton, who had been visiting at the home of her daughter, in Old Forge, started on foot to take a trolley car to go to Hyde Park. She was accompanied by her two grand-daughters, May and Margaret Clinch, aged 2 and 4 years respectively. While crossing an open bridge on the Erie and Wyoming Valley Railroad, which spans the Lackawanna River, a train approached. All three became frightened, and in trying to escape were struck by the engine, and fell into the stream below and were drowned.
