Council's Strike Committee Gets a Definite Proposition.

Street Railway Directors Willing to Take Back 30 Strikers.

And Reaffirm Their Offer to Arbitrate All Individual Grievances-Some Appearance of Stage Thunder.

Directors of the London Street Railway Company met the strike committee of the city council at the city hall this morning. An official proposition was made by the former with a view to the settlement of the difficulty with the men. It was to the effect that the company is willing to take back 25 to 30 of the strikers, and give the council an undertaking to submit any individual grievances to arbitration. The discussion lasted about an hour. Subsequently the committee

conferred with the strikers. Another meeting with the directors will be held progressive legislation, and here was at 11:30 tomorrow morning, and in the meantime it is understood the common opportunity where the Dominion pany will refrain from engaging new President T. H. Smallman, Manager Broderick and

sented the company. The members of the committee present were Ald Par-nell (chairman), Mayor Wilson, Ald. Wilkey, Carrothers, Graham, Rumball and Douglass.

The chairman explained the object in view in the organization of the com-

mittee, and said the aldermen desired to meet the company on the most friendly terms. Their desire was simply to bring to a close the existing state of affairs. Things could not go on as they were. No matter whether the fault was the company's or the strikers, it was a fact that the cars were not running so that the citizens could use them as they should. It was a vexed question, and one that was a

damage to the city of London.
("Hear, hear!" from the directors.) Mr. I F. Hellmuth, the company's solicitor, was then heard. The company could re-echo one statement the chairman had made, he said. It was deplorable that the present state of affairs existed. But they must take exception in a friendly way to the statement that the public could not use the cars, at all events during the hours they run.

Ald. Parnell said he did not mean it in that way. But there was something which made it so that the public would not use them.

Mr. Hellmuth, continuing, said the company would say, without vindictiveness, that under no circumstances would they displace the men who had come into their employ since the strike. Feeling that, the company had refrained from engaging any new men since the negotiations with members of the council during the past few days. The company was prepared to take back those of the strikers for whom they had room, provided their conduct had not been objectionable to the directors or the management. There were 70 odd men at present engaged, and the company would need from 25 to 30 more. The full strength of the service was from 95 to 110 men.

To Ald. Rumball, Mr. Hellmuth said that 23 of the present men employed on the railway are old employes; so

that 47 are new men. Mr. Carr, in reply to a question, said that all of these were motormen or conductors. None were barn-men.

Mr. Hellmuth went on: "The company will raise no objection to any of the men joining a union or any other organization, but they are absolutely determined that they will not oblige any employe to become a member of some association. There can be no happy outcome of any negotiations, which have in view the compelling of the men to become members of a un-ion. It is to be distinctly understood also that each one of the men shall have a right regarding any grievance they may have against the management; if it cannot be settled by the management or the directors, to refer it to arbitration. We will give a letter to the council to that effect. The arbitration to be according to the Ontario act. The employes to appoint an arbiter, the company to appoint one, and the county judge a third. grading at all. Ald. Parnell—Is it your intention to continue that? Mr. Carr said he could not speak for the future intentions of the com-pany. He could say, however, that it would be continued until the ranks

were filled up.

The reduction of the time from ten hours per day to nine hours was men-tioned, and Mr. Smallman said the men had voluntarily made the reductioned,

Ald. Parnell pressed his question as to the company's intention regarding the men they might take back now.

Mr. Hellmuth—Those men will all be getting 15½ cents an hour. There will not be any grading among them, certainly. We don't intend to put a man back after he has been on six months. Mr. Hellmuth went on to say that if anything was to be done, it would only be fair to the company and the men that it be done as rapidly as possible.

The company was deliberately refusing from engaging men. Ald. Rumball figured that there were 77 men out on strike at present. Of these the company were willing to take

back about 30. He asked if some of the men now on did not understand that their work was only temporary? Mr. Carr said they all had perma-

nent jobs, and had put up with the unpleasantness of the past five weeks for that reward ahead of them.

To Ald. Graham, Mr. Carr said that only two detectives acted as motormen or conductors, and they received

3½c an hour less than the others.

Ald. Rumball—I see no chance of a settlement if you won't take back more than 30 of the strikers. Ald. Parnell thanked the directors for the hearing and urged them to look at the situation from the standpoint of

dealing with the men in as broad and

liberal a way as possible. Mr. Smallman said that had been their policy for the past five weeks. They had made a careful selection of the new men, most of whom were just as good citizens as the old men. He read the company's offer of May 22, the day of the strike, and claimed that they had then offered arbitration. They had done all that any business men could do. They had shown by their actions all through that they ready to take back some of the men. "But," he said, "if the management turn down any of the men they have employed since the strike, I'll go down with them. ("Hear, hear," said the other directors. The strikers had us We didn't have them tied. But notwithstanding the bad treatment they had received, they were willing to take back some of the strikers.

However, the doors are closing fast. By the end of the week they will be blocked tight." Ald. Rumball-If the company had hired citizens in the first place, they would not have had all this trouble."

Mr. Carr—We have 46 citizens now.

Ald. Rumball said it would be in the (Continued on page 6.)
