## DARCY-SMITH BOUT TO BE CALLED OFF

Governor Pleasant Requests That Fight Be Cancelled,

New Orleans, April 13.—With the advice that Les Darcy, the Australian pugilist, "follow the noble example of Georges Carpentier, now fighting on the French match-niaker of a local athletic club, to cancel the twenty-round bout scheduled to be held here April 23 between Darcy an Jeff Smith of New York.
