LUCKY BALDWIN DEAD. LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 1.—E. J. (Lucky) Baldwin died at his home at Arcadia on Baldwin's Ranch, to-day, after an illness of several weeks. He was 51 years of age.

No man identified with horse breeding and the racing of thoroughbreds was more widely known throughout the country than E. J. (Lucky) Baldwin. He was born in Illinois and was brought up in Racine, Wis., where in 1883 he sold out his store and came to California. It was in Saratoga, N.Y., while attending the races that he decided to acquire a stable of his own and from the start his ventures were attended with the success that won for him the sobriquet of "Lucky."

The fortune left by Mr. Baldwin is estimated by H. A. Unruh, his manager, at \$25,000,000.
