Marathon Derby press reports had Alf.
Strubb doing training stunts on the roads
around New York when he was running
a little easy race at Ottawa, Ont. This
was on Tuesday, on a track laid out on
the Arena ice, ten miles against Abbie
Weods of Montreal, and the Englishman
made the remarkably good time of 53,44.
At first it was announced that Shrubb's
time was 51.24, and he believed himself
the maker of a new world's record for
an indoor track, but after examination of
the time by miles the former was announced as the correct one.

Shrubb won by four laps, which represents about one-third of a mile, but Woods ran a remarkably good race. He layed with Shrubb for two miles, and then the Englishman gained a lap, increasing gradually until he had four. At tice last mile Shrubb attempted to gain another lap, but to the surprise of the clowd the Montreal man stayed with him, actually gaining on the marvelous Britisher in the last round. Both finished with a wouderful spurt.

The crowd contained some coarse citizens, and numbered about a thousand. Shrubb, altho a strong favorite with his own countrymen, aroused no sympathy in the hearts of the younger element, who repeatedly shouted that Longboat was coming, and who cheered Shrubb's opponent at every opportunity.

Porhaps these little Marathons are good training incidents for the big affairs. Maloney, who is credited with holding the world's record for 26 miles 385 yards, has one on to-night in New York. At all events, the Longboat is the favorite, there is wise money going down on Shrubb by those who think the Indian is not in shape. Bob Simpson of Hamilton, who has always been a staunch supporter of Longboat, has switched over to Shrubb, and has already, \$4000 on the Englishman, with more coin of the realm to bet.
