

WAR TAX MISSES MANY OF LARGEST INCOMES

Impost on War Profits Deemed Fair, and Will Be Accepted.

Silver and Gold Mining Company ies May Devote Bullion to Buying Bonds.

MONTREAL, Feb. 18-The general

opinion is that the new war tax on profits is a fair one and will have to be accepted by all. But it does not reach everyone, nor was it intended to. There are many men in Canada of large incomes who can afford to pay a war tax out of their large incomes. Some of them pay-where they own stocks in companies that will have to contribute on their profits. They are not in business. The minister of finance may throw out a dragnet for these big fish before the debate is over. A list of these fortunate individuals in our big cities, including Montreal, would perhaps surprise the public.
