The Committee would also desire to acknowledge with great satisfaction that other exertions, unconnected with the Union, for the benefit of the Rising generation begin to display themselves in the city; and that endeavours are now making, under the sanction and encouragement of the Worthy Rector of the Parish and his amiable Curate, of establishing a Sunday School in Connection with Trinity Church.

It cannot be considered as a thing problematical, whether Sunday Schools are beneficial. Education, considered in the general, is attended with many invaluable benefits, which, in this enlightened age, it is not necessary to mention. In common with other seminaries of learning, Sunday Schools must be allowed to possess these. But there are two relations in which Sunday Schools may be considered and which form their distinctive character, when compared with other seminaries. The first is, in their extending the means of education to the very lowest in the community and to such as by their indigence and employment are completely debarred from attending the regular Schools. The second is, in their having for their principal medium of instruction, that best of books, the Bible, and in their embracing, as subjects of instruction, things that pertain in the Life beyond the grave. In the first relation Sunday Schools may be considered as a political good; for if knowledge be power, then in proportion as knowledge is increased, power is increased, the strength and union of the state is increased. Vice and Immorality generally proceed from ignorance or neglected education, and we all know that these weaken our political strength; and that the general prevalence has always been the forerunner of the decay and fall of Empires. Sunday Schools then, should stand illustriously high in the estimation of every true Patriot, every true lover of his Country, every friend to social peace and order. In their they leave the opportunity of thinning the ranks of the profligate, and of extending the ranks of those, who, by their industry and virtue, form the strongest bulwark of every well regulated constitution, and in this view of Sunday Schools does not the argument come with power upon every class of men? Does not the Magistrate behold in them, an Institution, which, if universally supported, would counteract much of that vice and licentiousness, which in his official capacity, he must often necessarily encounter? Does not the Master see in Sunday Schools, fit places for training up Servants and Apprentices to be virtuous in their habits and steady in their occupations? and does not the Parent consider them as places of refuge for his children from the contamination of that vicious example which is exhibited by the open Sabbath breaking?

But when we consider Sunday School in the second relation we mentioned, viz. in the Bible being made the principal medium of instruction, they become still more interesting. About fifty years ago, this best of books was made the medium of instruction in almost all Schools—but the refinements of this age have nearly banished it altogether, and it is much to be feared that unless the general use of it in the Sunday Schools happily counteract, this innovation upon the good old system, will tell dismally upon happy old England before the lapse of another generation. It is our apprehension that some thing like loose infidelity, stalks already about, unobscured and with unobscuring front. Many of the Great Jehovah, who rule in Heaven above and in the Earth below, if it be according to the purpose of his divine will, mercifully prevent such a dismal period—may he pour down His Holy Spirit, that the hearts of the Fathers may be turned to the Children, and the hearts of the Children to the Fathers, lest he come and smite the Earth with a curse.—In mentioning the Bible as the medium of instruction used in the Sunday Schools, to what true Christian's heart does it not bring delightful associations and sweet contemplations? are not his thoughts carried back into Eternity and forward into Eternity? does he not find himself led out into the sweet consideration of that series of divine arts towards his unworthy and sinful soul, denoted in that most comprehensive expression of the Apostle Jude, "Sanctified by God the Father, preserved in Jesus Christ and called into His Kingdom in His Trinity of Persons, Father, Son & Holy Ghost? and does he not receive, fresh impressions concerning his everlasting salvation, which the Father purchased by the shedding of His most precious blood, and the Holy Ghost sanctified by His sacred and inviolable Spirit upon his mind? and, is he not, with the Bible and the youth of the Sunday Schools associated together in his mind, led into prayer unto God, that through the medium of his own inspired volume, the Holy Ghost, the founder, and builder of the Church, may open the understanding of many of the youth, that they may be enabled to discern those things which they see that are carnal and unprofitable; that they may be convinced of sin, righteousness and judgment, and that they may be converted to the Lord, and that they may be brought to the front of the Cross, with the exclamation, "Lord be merciful to me a sinner" and, "Lord save us from perishing", cries which are never uttered but under the influence of the Holy Spirit, without an application in due time, of the blood of Christ to the soul and conscience of the poor trembling sinner. For this must be the case with all in some manner or degree, the pangs of the New Birth must be felt before they can enter into the Kingdom of God, before they can enjoy those spiritual apprehensions, which are accompanied with righteousness, and Peace, and Joy in the Holy Ghost.
