**EGIN BIG ROUND-UP OF THE CENSUS SHIRKERS**

Subpoenas issued and 100 Other Cases Under Investigation by the Director Staff

New York, June 25.—Men and women who are trying to evade the State Military Census by giving false names and addresses are to be systematically hunted down and brought to the courts, it was announced at the office of the Director of the Census, at 261 Broadway, today.

Director E. P. Goodrich issued subpoenas for six persons during the day and about 100 other cases reported from registration stations are under investigation.

Two of the persons for whom subpoenas were issued are said to have

given false names and addresses in attempting to register. They have been investigated and reported "not found."

Service of a subpoena was made by proxy on another census offender, a member of his family accepting it, but Mr. Goodrich ordered that the man be served personally and be required to appear today at the census headquarters for an examination.

"We have a very good record of the number of people who are liable through the work of the police department in its check-census," said Director Goodrich. "For example, in City Island the people there estimated the total population within the military age limit at 800, and yet the police found 1,400 eligible persons living there. Many persons may believe they have escaped the police census, but they will find that their neighbors or dwellers in the same apartment house have furnished the necessary data by which we will be enabled to reach the shirkers."

**WANTS FLEETS TO FORCE ACTION**

Churchill Demands Aggressive Policy For Allies' Ships

DON'T WAIT FOR THE GERMANS

British Navy Then Liberated From Enchanted Submarine Circle and Enemy Compelled to Devote His Attention to Self Defence

London, June 25.—Winston Spencer Churchill, in an article in the Sunday Pictorial, demands an aggressive policy for the vast surplus fleets under the allies' command, especially since America's entrance into the war.

"The allied navies," he declared, "have today at least two dreadnoughts for every one at the disposal of Germany and Austria and in addition more than four old battleships to one for the enemy. But the superiority in weight of metal, modernity and tonnage is far greater, even than these immense figures imply. Are we really to be content to see this vast mass of about 200 battleships wallowing on the off chance of the German fleet emerging to fight until peace—perhaps an unsatisfactory peace—is declared?"

"When three old battleships were sunk in the Dardanelles it was represented as a great naval disaster but what kind of a disaster would it be when, on the day peace is signed, hundreds of battleships are found to be practically unused and pass into obsolescence to be supplanted in future wars by aeroplanes and submarines."

"We must have a vast blue water fleet capable of engaging the full strength of the enemy with good prospects of success, but after that has been provided for an immense surplus of old but valuable vessels remain and it is in their adaptation for use and employment in aggressive action that escape from the present deadlock can still be found. It is only when we are able to devise and execute some method of aggressive naval warfare against the Germans that we shall find his weakness and our strength, that we shall liberate our splendid navy from the enchanted circle the submarine has drawn about it and compel our enemies to absorb themselves so much in the process of their own defence as to leave them no leisure to compass our ruin."
