AREA OF LOS ANGELES NOW SECOND ONLY TO THAT OF NEW YORK

Los Angeles, Cal., May 17.—The report of J. D. Burke, efficiency director, places Los Angeles as the second city in the United States in point of area. This followed the annexation of San Fernando and Palms territory at a recent election.

The total area of the city now is 279 square miles. New York city, with 286 miles, is the only city with a larger expanse of territory.

The ten cities of the United States having the largest areas are:—New York, 286 square miles; Los Angeles, 279; New Orleans, 194; Chicago, 184; Philadelphia, 129; Cincinnati, sixty-six; St. Louis, sixty-one; Washington, D. C., sixty; Kansas City, fifty-eight; Rochester, fifty-seven.

This area excludes the water areas, which are sometimes included in statements of territorial area. If these were included New Orleans would have 270 square miles, San Francisco 127, and Seattle ninety-four, which would bring these cities in the list of ten largest.

Los Angeles, however, still would remain second in the country.

THIS IS CLEAN-UP WEEK IN BANGOR

Health and Cleanliness the Slogan
—East Side Three Days; West Side Also Three

This is clean-up and paint-up week in Bangor, and also will mark the observance, for the first time, of health week in Maine. Health week will be observed simultaneously in Bangor, Lewiston and Portland, the distinguished speakers who have been engaged for addresses being booked for appearances in each of these cities.

Co-operating with the Chamber of Commerce movement for an annual clean-up and paint-up week, the city council voted to authorize Street Commissioner Pressey to give the use of teams of his department for the collection of rubbish. This will be the arrangement.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the streets of the east side.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the streets of the west side.

In connection with getting ready for the collection of rubbish, ashes, etc., for the collection by the city teams, it is emphasized that all rubbish and ashes must be placed in barrels, boxes or other receptacles. With the exception of boughs, used for house-banking, the teams will collect nothing that is placed in the street, and only refuse in receptacles will be taken up.

"Owing to the expected influx of tourists and automobilists into Maine this year," said a member of the chamber of commerce committee "we are especially anxious to make even a better record at cleaning up than a year ago when a surprisingly large number of wagonloads of rubbish were carted to the dumps. Not only is clean-up week a big advantage from the viewpoint of improving the city's appearance but the cleaning out of sheds, attics, yards and alleyways means the conferring of practical benefit as well as what might be called an aesthetic benefit."

The chamber of commerce committee appreciates very much the co-operation of Mayor Robinson and the city council, in fact, without the assistance of the street department, it would be impossible to have clean-up week as the cost of hiring teams would make it prohibitive."

Dear Sir:—You probably have seen that the city council at its meeting Tuesday night voted to co-operate with the chamber of commerce in making the week of May 17 the annual clean-up week. Last year it was held the first week in May but the general impression has been that for Bangor the third week is better than the first.

The chamber of commerce committee is asking the co-operation of all its members to make the week a success—to make possible the obtaining of results that will make for Bangor's improvement in appearance, increase its attractiveness for out-of-town visitors and tourists, and to lessen the fire hazards by cleaning up rubbish, boxes and all forms of refuse.

You can be of material assistance if you will arrange window displays of articles and goods for outdoor or indoor cleaning up and painting. You also can help stir up general interest in the movement by mentioning in your advertising matter "Bangor's annual clean-up and paint-up week. In many cities clean-up week is an exceptionally good business getter."

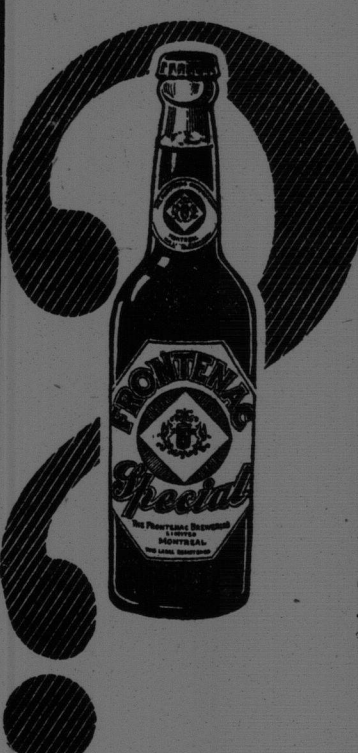
