## PROMINENT MEN ARE HEARD BY CANADIAN CLUB

Visitors for Bar Association Meetings Address Members at Dinner

Distinguished visitors here for the Canadian Bar Association meetings addressed the Canadian Club last evening at a dinner in the Admiral Beatty Hotel. W. Grant Smith presided. The speakers were: Rt. Hon. Hugh F. MacMillan, K.C., of Edinburgh and London, former Scottish Advocate-General; Rt. Hon. Lord Darling of Langham, Maître Georges Chrestell, of the Bar of Paris, Hon. Chief Justice Mar-

tin, Dominion vice-president of the Canadian Bar Association and Acting Chief Justice of Quebec, and Sir J. Douglas Hazen.

The chairman, in his opening remarks, referred to the assistance rendered the Canadian Club by C. F. Sanford, K.C., of this city, vice-president for New Brunswick of the Canadian Bar Association, in arranging for last night's program.

Hon. Mr. MacMillan urged that to maintain the bond of sympathy between our two great countries and to strengthen the ties of affection and unity between us, there should be a far greater volume of Canadian news printed in British and British news printed in Canada than is now the custom. He was sure much benefit would accrue to both Canada and the mother country.

### LORD DARLING SPEAKS.

Lord Darling spoke of the ideals of the British Empire and said that Canada, at the time of the Great War, had responded to the call from the Mother Country in a characteristically enthusiastic and sturdy fashion.

"We didn't win the war, no," said Lord Darling, "but we made it easy for others to win it. We have emerged from the conflict poor, you, I and

the British Empire, but we have come out of it as proud as when we entered." "It is a change, of course, for many of us to find ourselves poor," Lord Darling continued, "but there are things that money cannot buy. I do not mean that we are vainglorious, but we are proud to be able to say that we will pay our debts, even if it costs us our last shilling."

Maitre Georges Chrestell, when introduced by the chairman, was accorded a tumultuous reception. He began his brief address in English, but com-

pleted his remarks in the French tongue.

### GIVEN RECEPTION.

Maitre Chrestell referred to the ties of affection and loyalty between his country and the British Empire and said they were sacred bonds. He spoke of the inspirational addresses he had heard while attending the Bar Association functions and wished the association and its president, and the Canadian Club all future prosperity.

Hon. Chief Justice Martin said that Great Britain and Canada should know each other better and therefore men of the calibre and fame of Lord Darling and Hon. Mr. Macmillan were invited to visit the Dominion. "When you return to the Motherland," said Hon. Mr. Martin, "tell your people

while there may be slight differences between us, we are all working to the same end, and under the same ideals, to make this land a better land in which to live. We are proud to be part of the British Empire," he concluded amidst hearty applause.

Sir Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice of New Brunswick, was called upon by the chairman to move a vote of thanks to the speakers. Sir Douglas said he was proud to be called upon to perform such a pleasant duty, and in his character and ability of such distinguished men as Lord Darling, Hon. Mr. Macmillan and Maître Chrestell, and Hon. Chief Justice Martin.

Sir Douglas in speaking of Chief Justice Martin, said that his visit here as well as that of many other central and western Canada representatives, would do much in binding the provinces of the west and those of the east in firmer bonds of mutual friendship, trust and profit.

Dr. J. M. Magee ably seconded the motion. The chairman thanked the speakers for the formal thanks of the club and wished them success and happiness in the years to come. The National Anthem brought the gathering to a close.

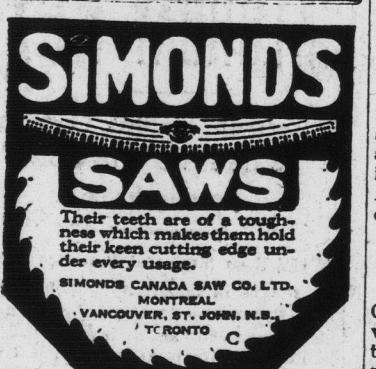

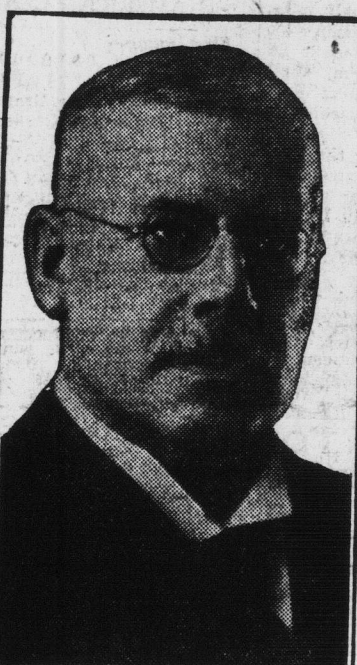
