CAMPBELLTON FAILS TO STOP N. S. CHAMPIONS

Truro Again Shuts Out N. B. Title Holders Last Night

CAMPBELLTON, March 12.—The Truro Bearcats tonight in the Campbellton Arena captured the Maritime Hockey Championship and the star shield from the Campbellton Hockey Club team by a score of 2 to 0 in a very hot, which was witnessed by nearly 2,000 fans. The game was not what anyone would call a clean one, but the speed exhibited took the crowd's attention, more than the rough work displayed.

The Truro Bearcats have a fast and aggressive team, showing great team and combination play, also a great deal of back checking. The forward line of the visitors is a pleasure for any hockey fan to look at in action.

WAS BROKEN UP.
The local team was also going fast but their combination plays were broken up in the first part of the game and they were forced to resort to individual play. The first period opened with the speed of a tornado and with stick handling that has never been witnessed here in this arena before.

Truro made a dash for the local territory, but were stopped by the efforts of McLean and Sharpe, who were right on edge at the sound of the whistle. The locals retaliated with terrific speed and threatened the visitors' net. There was no scores notched in this period, although it looked many times as though the goal would be broken, but McKenney and Guinan, in the nets, were responsible for the zero score. The forward lines of both teams were fast with the defence blocking and stopping many rushes on both sides.

TRURO BREAKS THROUGH.
Truro took the lead in the second period of one goal, the only tally notched in this period. Things were rugged up quite a bit and players of both teams were given many free trips to the box. Murdoch scored for Truro shortly after the first goal.

Truro may have had the majority of territory play in Truro Tuesday evening but they did not have it here tonight. The players of both teams rushed the game from the start, and it was kept the crowd in a state of frenzied excitement. In the third period Truro notched another.

Truro received the most penalties, the referee handed out the game coming in for much criticism.

At the close of the game Frank Wilson, president of the M. A. H. A., and I. Logan Barnhill, secretary, presented the Marven trophy to the Campbellton Hockey Club for winning the championship of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The star shield was presented to the Truro Bearcats for winning the Maritime championship.

CRUCIAL GAMES PENDING.

MONTREAL, March 13.—The Pirates now lead the Bruins by one point in the N. H. L. standing. Pirates play Ottawa Monday, and Boston is at Montreal Tuesday. If the Pirates win from the Senators they will maintain third place and qualify for the remaining position in the elimination round, regardless of the outcome of the Boston-Montreal clash.
