N. B. TEACHER DIES IN WATER NEAR WOODSTOCK

STANLEY CLOWES
IS STRICKEN
WHILE BATHINGBody Is Recovered Soon
After Near Scene of
FatalityDOCTOR PRONOUNCES
WEAK HEART CAUSEVictim Formerly Resided in
Fredericton; Is Survived
by Mother

WOODSTOCK, July 27.—Stanley Clowes, 25, manual training instructor in the Moncton city schools, drowned at Skiff Lake, about 27 miles from here, between 6 and 7 o'clock this evening.

According to the details received here, Mr. Clowes arrived at Skiff Lake on Monday night in the party of C. Douglas Dickson, of this place, with the intention of spending the week there. Last evening three of the party went out in a boat to swim in the lake. Clowes was swimming near the boat, and Mrs. Dickson noticed that he seemed to be swimming feebly, but as he made no outcry she did not consider him in difficulty. Clowes suddenly sank from sight within three or four feet of the boat.

Dr. Landon, of this place, who was spending a vacation at Skiff Lake was on the scene at the time and, with the assistance of others who were in the vicinity, a search was made for the body which was found after about an hour. The doctor made an examination and stated that there was no water in the lungs and that death was apparently due to heart failure.

Young Clowes' former home was in Fredericton. His mother survives.

LONE BANDIT GETS
\$3,860 IN HOLD-UP

NEW YORK, July 28.—With the command, "Give me that satchel, bud," a lone bandit confronted Andrew McCann, 21 years old, a messenger for the Metropolitan Safe Deposit Company, and took two pay rolls aggregating \$3,860.

McCann had set out from the deposit company with three pay rolls to deliver. He was driving an automobile and was within a few feet of his destination when an automobile, which had been following him, drew over to the curb and stopped.

The bandit jumped on the running board, presented a pistol at his back, and directed the messenger to hand over the satchel. In possession of the money the robber re-entered his car and swept on and was lost in the distance before pursuit was possible.

EMPLOYEES DIVIDE
LARGE SUM IN TIPSEight Million Francs go to Those
at Casino in Four
Months

PARIS, July 28.—Employees of the Casino de France have split an 8,000,000 franc melon which grew from the tips of the gamblers during the last four months. This sum will provide a record salary, to all attaches.

The casino books show that the receipts for the last season were unprecedented. The house percentage from the tables amounted to 33,900,000 francs, 2,000,000 francs better than last year and 9,000,000 more than 1923-24.

The fact that the city of Cannes receives but 1,500,000 francs from the casino, while the employees draw 8,000,000 is causing much dissatisfaction among the citizens. They are urging the necessity of placing all casino employees on salaries. Most employees draw no salaries but wait until the close of the season, when the tips are apportioned. A head croupier under the present system earns from 60,000 to 100,000 francs, a season.

HAYING IN WESTMORLAND.
MONCTON, July 27.—Haymaking is under way in the eastern end of the county, and the crop is reported to be an average one in most places.

SAYS MIND MORE
ALERT AT NIGHTDr. Johnson Asserts Rest Evenly
Distributed Throughout
Sleep

PITTSBURGH, July 28.—The mind is more alert before a night's sleep than it is just after rising in the morning. This is the conclusion reached after an extensive study of sleep made by scientists at the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research at Pittsburgh. The tests were made on students in a local university who volunteered for the purpose.

It was found that the students performed mental tests better at night than in the morning. However, it was noted that the results in the morning were much better after a series of exercises. There is a popular impression that a restless sleeper changes his position very little during the night. But the tests showed that the sleepers remained in one position without moving only about eleven minutes on an average.

"Our results in this present form," declared Dr. H. M. Johnson, head of the experiments, "contradict a number of previous studies. One of these is that the earlier hours passed in bed are the most restful. This is true only for a small minority of the subjects. For a number of the periods of longest rest are pretty evenly distributed among the four quarters of the night. For some the last quarter is most free from activity."

"Recalling advice frequently given students to do their studying before breakfast while their minds are still fresh, the results of the night and morning tests are at variance with that belief, but a decision is yet to be made on what interpretation these results will bear. Recuperative effects of sleep undoubtedly exist, but they are obscured by other factors for some hours."

BIG INCREASE IN
ALCOHOLIC DEATHSInsurance Table Shows Increase
6 to 3.6 Per 100,000 in 7
Years

NEW YORK, July 28.—Deaths from alcoholism have increased by 600 per cent. since prohibition went into effect, according to a mortality table compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company and issued this week for the information of industrial policy holders in this country and Canada.

There is an increase of about 25 per cent. in the alcoholic deaths of 1926, as compared with those of 1925. The table shows that the number of deaths from this cause is steadily increasing.

The table, it is admitted, has marked limits, as it is based only on the 17,000,000 of North America's total population with which the company has dealings. The fact is stressed, however, that, as far as it goes, the table is substantiated by the figures gathered for all the country by the United States Census Bureau. The government statistics have been brought up to the end of 1925 only.

In the table of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company the figures in the column listing deaths from alcoholism take a decided leap after the advent of prohibition, and this jump continues

134,486 Radio Sets
Licensed in Canada

OTTAWA, July 28.—Every year the owner of a radio receiving set in Canada is required to procure a license from the Canadian Department of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, at a cost of \$1. The Canadian government made an official report on the registrations for the fiscal year ended March, 1926, which showed that licenses had been issued to 134,486 persons, as follows:—

Ontario, 60,110; Quebec, 21,141; Saskatchewan, 15,944; Manitoba, 14,003; British Columbia, 9,494; Alberta, 7,152; Nova Scotia, 3,288; New Brunswick, 2,612; Prince Edward Island, 202; Yukon, 28, and the Northwest Territories, 17.

The Metropolitan figures show that in 1920, the year the Volstead act was made operative, the percentage was .6. In 1921 it was 2.1, in 1922 3 per cent, in 1924 it was 2.8 per cent, and for 1925 it was 2.9 per cent.

The Metropolitan figures for the first six months of 1926 show another record jump, standing today at 3.6 per cent. for every 100,000 policy holders.

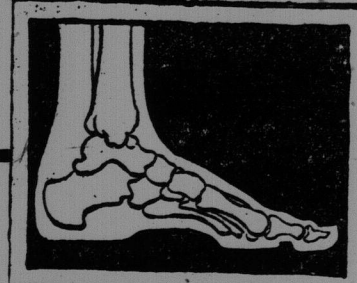

2 STORESAPPARENTLY DEAD;
RESTORED TO LIFERare Medical Feat Saves Child
Seemingly Dead Eight
Minutes

PHILADELPHIA, July 28.—By a rare feat of medical science, Adelaide Rose Weiss, five years of age, is alive in St. Mary's Hospital, after having been apparently dead for eight minutes.

An injection of adrenalin, resorted to in a desperate hope, brought the child back to life after the effects of an operation for removal of tonsils and adenoids had apparently proved fatal. Gasping for air, she took blood into her lungs and was suffocated.

Dr. Morris Smith, connected with St. Mary's Hospital, administered adrenalin injections into the girl's heart. Oxygen also was given. Slow minutes passed without response in the child. Tests showed negative results.

Dr. Smith continued working over the child, and finally, as the attending nurses counted out the minutes, the pulse began to flutter. There was an almost imperceptible heart beat. The color of life stole faintly back into her cheeks.

Such an operation has been performed before, and successfully," Dr. Smith said, "but I have never before heard of an injection being successful in a child of this age after so long a period of death. Generally it is used in the case of a new-born baby, and the period of death is much shorter."
