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
London, Sept. 30—Prime Minister MacDonald moved second reading in the House of Commons today of the bill providing for the creation of an Irish Boundary Commission without the participation of Ulster. In making the motion, the Premier declared it was the essential duty of every government to fulfil its obliga-tions. He said he resented the charge that the Goyernment's move was an attempt to coerce Ulster. Herbert Asquith, former premier and Liberal leader, declared that the Lib-reats would give the Irish bill their hearty and undivided support.


