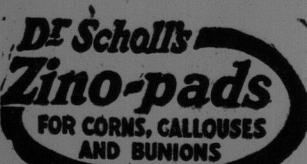
Wilson Wins.

Speed Boat Races.
Peoria, Ill., July 5.—In the final heats of the speed boats in the Mississippi Valley power boat regatta, yesterday, "Miss Chicago" in a competitive run against "Oh, Min," Cleveland, completely eclipsed her rival, again winning the Webb free-for-all trophy.

Leaping high in the air while rounding the post for the final lap in the 940 event, "Peggy," world's champion speed boat of the 750 class, owned by Fred Schramm of Milwaukee, turned a complete somersault and sank. Her driver and mechanic were rescued.

SIX MONTHS FOR RUM RUNNERS AT SKOWHEGAN
Skowhegan, July 4.—Jean Buske of St. Zacharie, Canada, and James Morrow of Rockwood were given hearings in Skowhegan Saturday before Judge W. Sawyer of Western Somerset Municipal Court and found guilty of illegal transportation and possession of intoxicating liquor. Each was given six months in jail, fine of \$500 and cost and six months additional in default of payment. Morrow and Buske were apprehended after midnight Thursday by Deputy Sheriff Lehanan. M. Smart of Rockwood on the upper reaches of Moose river, bringing in 25 quarts of Canadian whiskey. They reached Skowhegan Friday night. Buske's horse and wagon confiscated.
