MORE ATROCITIES BY THE TURKS

Greek and American Christians Suffer—Britain to Make Protest.

London, April 7.—An official British protest is understood to be in prospect as a result of alleged Turkish cruelties and atrocities on Greek and Armenian Christians in Asia Minor. A Turkish terror lasting three days is reported to have occurred in Caesarea, in which many Greek and Armenian Christians were killed.
