STRIKE ENDS

Carpenters Come to Terms; Ottawa Expects Building

Ottawa, June 22—An agreement was signed yesterday between the Ottawa district council of carpenters and the district council of carpenters and the Ottawa branch of the association of building and construction industries, thus terminating a strike which has been in progress since May 1.
