Thrilling Pictures of African Hunt at Opera House

Six Reels of Remarkable Films Enjoyed by Large Audience—Will Continue All Week

Packed houses greeted the first two showings of the Paul J. Rainey's African hunt pictures in the Opera House yesterday. From an instructive and scenic standpoint these pictures are the best that have been seen in this country.

The pictures were obtained only after twelve months of painstaking labor and an expenditure said to be a quarter of a million of dollars. The 350 men who assisted in the work of securing these marvelous pictures of real life did so at great personal risk. A particularly thrilling scene is shown where a giant rhinoceros, while being pictured, charges the tree in which Hemment, the photographer, was stationed with his camera, and the life of the camera man was saved only by the timely shot of Allen Black, the marksman of the party.

The hunt is shown in six pictures, between which colored slides of scenes in different stages of the hunt are shown. In the first reel is pictured the preparation for the safari, or trip across country, in which is shown the unloading of the supplies from the trains and loading them on the backs of the native porters. The loads are then transferred to the backs of a number of camels for the desert journey.

The second section shows the setting of the traps and the capture therein of the jackal and hyena. An interesting feature of the section was the placing of the trapped animals in cages for shipment to the zoological gardens.

Then follows the evolution of the ostrich from the time it is no larger than a chicken until it has reached maturity. On the same reel is shown pictures of the leopard hunt, in which the dogs track the quarry to a tree and the dogs then climb to the top of the branches and dislodge the leopard. As he alights on the ground the dogs are upon him and kill him.

Perhaps the most exciting and novel part of the picture is that taken at the water hole, where eight different species of animals are seen slaking their thirst at the same time. It was only after waiting for seventy-two hours that Mr. Hemment was able to get this picture. When he first started the film clicking there were two rhinoceroses drinking but four more of the beasts came along and a lively scarp was witnessed between two of them.

While the fight was going on two giraffes timidly approached and after the larger animals had satisfied their thirst they also drank their fill and went away. They were succeeded in turn by a herd of elephants between two of whom the last section opens with a scene of the party taking lunch in camp where they are notified by the natives that lions are in the vicinity. The trailing dogs locate the scent and round up the lion in a thicket where, after an exciting battle, the hunting dogs finally hold him until he is dispatched by a bullet from Mr. Rainey's gun.

The pictures, as a whole, are unusually clear when one takes into consideration the difficulties under which they were obtained. A lecture delivered by Dr. F. N. H. during the showing of the pictures, explained many of the situations and served as a guide to the methods of the hunt.

The pictures will be shown all this week both afternoon and evening.
