TWO CHILDREN DIE IN BATH, N. B. FIRE

NEIGHBOR IS BADLY BURNED TRYING RESCUE

Little Sons of Gideon Brooks Victims In Blaze

PARENTS ABSENT Father at Work and Mother Attending Entertainment in Town Hall

Special to The Times-Star. BATH, N. B., May 14.—Little Freddie Brooks, aged four years, and his baby brother, Earl, aged eight months, children of Gideon Brooks, were burned to death early this morning, when their home, in which they had been left alone, was completely destroyed by fire.

ATTEMPT AT RESCUE When the fire was first discovered William Gorman attempted to enter the building from the front but was driven back by the setting flames.
