CONDITIONS FORCE REFORMS IN BRITISH GOVERNMENT (Continued from page 1.)

Great Britain would owe the United States at the end of March, 1920, a total estimated at par of exchange of \$242,000,000, while the amount which Allied governments would owe to Great Britain at the same date was estimated at £1,740,000,000.

A revised statement of army expenditures showed a gross total for the financial year 1918-20 of £200,000,000 instead of the total of £240,000,000 originally estimated. The receipts from the sale of materials and from payments by Germany for the army of occupation amounted to £285,000,000, making the net total expenditure £125,000,000. Thus the final figures show an increase over the estimates of £118,000,000.

The increase in the appropriations is explained as due to delays in demobilization, the raising of pay of soldiers and increases in receipts caused by the ferment of payments by Germany for the army of occupation.

The approximate cost of the recent railway strike to the British treasury was £10,000,000. The publicity campaign against the strike cost the government more than £282,000.

EDMUNDSTON GETS IN AHEAD OF ST. JOHN

Fletcher Peacock, director of vocational education, returned from Edmundston on Saturday, where he met with the town council and board of school trustees concerning the opening of vocational classes here this winter. It was decided to open evening classes in vocational work about the beginning of December.

A vocational committee will be appointed this week and a director selected for the school. Edmundston is also planning to erect a new school next summer to be used for vocational work, and, if the plans which are now being considered are carried out, Edmundston will then have the best vocational school in the province.

Mr. Peacock will leave tomorrow morning for St. John to attend the first meeting of their new vocational committee on Tuesday night.

CLOSING OF NOTABLE EPISCOPAL CONVENTION

Bishop Gailor Will Head Episcopal Council—Reject Clergyman's Plea for Political Prisoners—Urge Justice for The Negro

Adjourning to meet in Portland, Ore., in 1922, the Triennial General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in America on last Friday, meeting in Detroit, ended the most momentous session of its history.

Prominent men of the Episcopal church cite the following action, as marking progress along four general lines:

First, the almost complete re-organization of the church through the creation of an executive council and the granting of increased powers to provincial synods.

Second, the broadening of the Church's outlook on social matters, industrial questions and international affairs.

Third, the general approval of the movement toward church unity by amendment of the church constitution to make possible the proposed concordat with the Congregational church whereby ministers of that church may be ordained in the Episcopal faith, these amendments also making possible similar agreements with other denominations.

Fourth, the broadening of the worship of the church through the revision and enrichment of the Book of Common Prayer.

Overlooked in the press of final business, the proposal of the Board of Missions that it be authorized to co-operate in the Inter-Churches World Movement failed to obtain action, although almost unanimous approval of the movement was voiced by the delegates.

Great interest was shown today in the selection by the House of Bishops of Bishop Thomas F. Gailor of Tennessee as chairman of the new executive council which will handle the business of the church after January 1 next. Bishop Gailor will hold office until the next convention. He becomes by virtue of the office executive head of the church.

Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle of Missouri remaining its ecclesiastical head as presiding bishop, although eventually the two offices will combine.

Believing that the ministry of healing is a mission of the church and that its inclusion in the work of the church will add to and help hold the present membership, the convention appointed a commission to inquire into the question and report at the 1922 meeting.

The House of Bishops referred to the council an investigation of work among negroes, and a suggestion that a conference of racial representatives be held in each large city to consider greater social justice.

A resolution asking "discriminating executive clemency" for "political prisoners," including conscientious objectors, introduced by Bishop Benjamin Brewster of Maine, was adopted in the House of Bishops but almost unanimously voted down by the House of Deputies.

The Rev. Arthur W. Moulton rector of Grace Church, Lawrence, Mass., was elected by the House of Bishops to be Missionary Bishop of that territory, the Right Rev. Thomas J. Garland, Suffragan Bishop of Pennsylvania, who declined the election.

FAMINE'S VICTIMS WALKING SKELETONS Pictures of Misery in Hunger-Stricken Moscow's Streets

Paris, Oct. 27. (Associated Press.)—Pictures of Moscow's hunger are given in The Figaro by a Russian Princess, arriving from Russia. "I will not speak of the terrible, revolting and odious things that passed in the streets of Moscow," she said, "but only of the huge incidents I saw with my own eyes, and which were repeated day after day. I met a woman and child, ragged and thin as skeletons, the child crying constantly with an unchanging expression of terror. The mother said that her child was hungry and asked for a piece of bread, as they had not eaten for twenty-four hours. I opened my purse, but the woman turned away, saying: 'No money, but bread.'"

"Another time I saw a blonde-haired young girl with arms outstretched, leaning like a living crucifix against a wall, and murmuring: 'I am hungry.' Next day she died. I have seen in the middle of a side street a great, yellow, hollow-headed dog, carrying a bone with a little meat attached, while a ten-year-old boy a few steps away, with the pallor of long misery on his face, watched the dog as it hypnotized. With neck outstretched, mouth open, and fast clenched, he looked at the dog with naus and ferocity.

"I have seen children, hardly clothed, hollow-cheeked, and with forms like shadows, on their knees in the street trying to pick from between the paving stones grains of wheat that had fallen from a torn sack. I have seen before bakeries men, women and children, stretched on the cold stones, awaiting their turn to get their meagre ration of bread, and then often falling exhausted and dying at the door steps before they received it."

DAYLIGHT SAVING ASSURED BY MAYOR HYLAN, NEW YORK New York, Oct. 26.—Mayor Hylan has put New York on a daylight saving basis, despite congressional repeal of the National Daylight Saving law. He announced his official approval of a new ordinance providing that city clocks be turned ahead an hour at 2 a. m., on the last Sunday in April and turned back on the last Sunday in September.

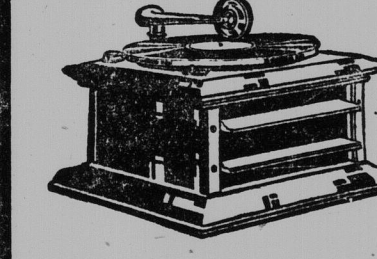
