EPISCOPAL CONVENTION

Bishop Gailor Will Head Episcopal Council - Reject Clemency Plea for Political Prisoners-Urge Justice for The Negro

Adjourning to meet in Portland, Ore. n 1922, the Triennial General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in America on last Friday, meeting in Detroit, ended the most momentous session of its history.

Prominent men of the Episcopal church cite the following action, as

marking progress along four general First, the almost complete re-organ-ization of the church through the crea-tion of an executive council and the granting of increased powers to prov-incial synods. Second, the broadening of the Church's

outlook on social matters, industrial questions and international affairs, ovement toward church unity by endment the church constitution make possible the proposed concordate with the Congregational church whereby ministers of that church may be or-dained in the Episcopal faith, these amendments also making possible sim-ilar agreements with other denomina-

Fourth, the broadefing of the worship of the church by the revision and enrichment of the Book of Common Pray-

Overlooked in the press of final business, the proposal of the Board of Missions that it be authorized to co-operate n the Inter-Church World Movemen failed to obtain action, although almost unanimous approval of the movement was voiced by the delegates. Great interest was shown today in the selection by the House of Bishops of Bishop Thomas F. Gailor of Tennessee as chairman of the new executive council which will handle the business of the church after January 1 next. Bishop Gailor will hold office until the next nvention. He becomes by virtue of e office executive head of the church, Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle of Missouri remaining its ecclesiastical head as presiding bishop, although eventually the two offices will combine. Believing that the ministry of healing s a mission of the church and that its

inclusion in the work of the church will add to and help hold the present membership, the convention appointed a com-mission to inquire into the question and eport at the 1922 meeting.

The House of Bishops referred to the puncil an investigation of work among negroes, and a suggestion that a conference of racial representatives be held in each large city to consider greater socia

A resolution asking "discriminating executive elemency" for "political prisoners," including conscientious objectors, introduced by Bishop Benjamin Brewster of Maine, was adopted in the House of Bishops but almost unanimous-ly rested down by the House of Deput. voted down by the House of Depututs,

I have seen before bakeries men, women and children, stretched on the cold stones, awaiting through days and nights their turn to get their meagre ration of bread, and then often falling exhausted and dying at the door steps before they received it."




