CAR DRIVEN BY GIRL CRUSHES TWO MEN

A big touring car with a twenty-year-old girl at the wheel left the roadway in Broadway at 101st street yesterday, snapped off a fire hydrant and a post and crashed two elderly men against an apartment house wall, killing them instantly.

Just before noon Miss Miriam Eppmann told her father, Mark Eppmann, a salesman of 45 west 102nd street, that she was going to a riding academy in the Sixties near Central Park for a jump through the park. She took her father's big car and started.

While going down Broadway Miss Eppmann saw a car draw out of 101st street and head east. She signalled to the other car but the driver did not stop. The girl fearing a collision, swerved sharply to the right.

On the corner, partly concealed behind the fire alarm post were Homer Gibson, sixty-five, a retired dealer in electrical supplies, living at 522 West 102nd street, and Jacob Zineman, sixty-three, of 24 Hamilton Terrace, a wealthy jeweler, who two years ago retired from the firm of Lyman, Kramer & Co., Maiden Lane and Nassau street. The jeweler and Mr. Gibson, previously unacquainted, had met at 101st street, when Mr. Gibson stopped to admire Mr. Zineman's collar. Just as Mr. Gibson bent to pet the dog's head, the Eppmann car fairly jumped out of the roadway and crashed into the post and hydrant. Then it crushed the men against the wall.

THE SUGAR SUPPLY FOR PRESERVING

(Ottawa Official Bulletin.)

During the tender fruit shipping season last year there was a shortage of refined sugar, and consumers could not obtain the quantity necessary for preserving. The shortage was more acute in the prairie provinces than in any other part of Canada, and the wholesale jobbers were obliged to limit their purchases to the extent to which sugar was available. This resulted in indiscriminate consigning of fruit, and lower prices to the growers.

The question of Canada's sugar requirements for 1920 was given earnest consideration by the dominion government, and it was arranged that the Canadian Trade Commission should have charge of imports and exports, would issue no permits for the export of sugar until such time as there was a surplus which Canada would not require. If at any time there was a surplus, the trade and consumers would be advised and given an opportunity to purchase it before it was issued for export. No permits have been issued for the export of granulated sugar since January 1. The Canadian Trade Commission last March issued a statement through the press referring to the sugar situation, and recommended that house-keepers should then plan to provide for their requirements for the preserving season. Up to date, the refiners have made deliveries twenty per cent in excess of the amount distributed at the same date last year, and reports from the wholesale and retail grocers indicate that many housekeepers acted upon the suggestion of the Canadian Trade Commission. The situation, however, is still uncertain, and should the crop of tender fruits be large, there may be some difficulty in obtaining sufficient supplies of sugar to meet the requirements but, from the information obtained from official sources, the outlook at the present time is not such as should have any unbalancing effect on fruit values. Every effort is being made to obtain a supply of sugar to meet the requirements of the preserving season, but housekeepers who have not yet made provision for their needs, would be well advised to do so as early as possible.

PREHISTORIC MONSTER.

Bones Weighing 4,000 Pounds Found Near Lyons.

Paris, June 10.—The bones of a prehistoric monster, of which one tooth weighed more than sixteen pounds, have been dug up by workmen at Chagny near Lyons. The discovery is considered of first-rate importance by Professor Mayet of Lyons and other scientists who have examined the bones. They declare that they are those of a warm climate elephant of much earlier period than the mammoth, which perished several thousand years ago.

The bones weigh in all over 4,000 pounds and show that the monster stood over fourteen feet high. It was furnished with ivory tusks nearly eight feet long and twenty inches in diameter. One of these, found in a sand-pit with other remains fifteen feet below the surface, weighs 400 pounds.

The fossilized remains are being taken to the science museum at Lyons for preservation.

NEW RICH NOT CHARITABLE.
