## THE LIBERAL CONVENTION.

Conformably to a resolution adopted by the Liberal members of the House of Commons, last session, a convention of the Liberal Party is called to take place in the city of Ottawa, on the twentieth day of June next.

The convention shall be composed as follows: Each electoral district shall be represented by the Liberal member sitting for the same, or the Liberal candidate defeated at the last election held therein, and by five delegates appointed by the Liberal Association of the district. In an electoral district entitled to elect more than one member, the number of delegates to be appointed shall be at many times five as the district returns members.

The Liberal press throughout the land is especially and earnestly invited to attend.

## THE LIBERAL CONVENTION.

The Globe is pleased to note the fact that the York County Liberals are to hold a convention in the Temperance Hall a week from to-day, for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the coming convention of Dominion Liberals at Ottawa in June. It is important that the liberals of New Brunswick, as well as those of every other portion of the Dominion, should be carefully alive to the interests of their party, and of the interests of the Dominion as a whole, and there is no way in which those of York County can show a livelier interest in these matters than by appointing two prominent and able liberals, regardless of their position in local affairs, who could and would undertake to represent this section of the country independently, ably and fearlessly, and who would not be too much controlled by the opinions and actions of others.

It is very probable that Hon. F. P. Thompson, as the defeated Liberal candidate for this county in the last election, will be one and the leader of the delegates chosen, and we are very much pleased that the almost inevitable bitterness of feeling which his selection will call forth from that recalcitrant section of the local Liberal party who voted with the Tories at the last election, may prevent a wise and intelligent choice of colleagues to accompany him. About Mr. Thompson's abilities we have nothing to say, but he is evidently entitled to become the first choice of the convention; and if the Liberals here are Liberals at heart, if they are wise, and desire the success of their party and the prosperity of the Dominion they will unite in hearty accord to nominate and appoint efficient colleagues and substitutes. It is too late to deny or to deplore the scheme in the party in this county. We have seen abundant evidence in the past, both of its existence and of its fatal effects upon the solidity and influence of the party, and we ought surely to be allowed to hazard the hope that for the future it may be cured, and the two sections of the party joined together with a common strength of purpose and of action. There are four to be chosen besides Mr. Thompson, a number which ought surely to give an opportunity to every influential section of the party to secure a thorough representation. There are plenty of able, intelligent and experienced men in the county to choose from, and if a wise choice is not secured, it will be the fault of the convention. The objects for which the Ottawa convention is called are most essential and vital to the interests of the Dominion Liberals.

Having in view the approach of another general election Mr. Laurier and other leaders of the party have, with commendable foresight, decided to obtain the views of the representative delegates from all sections of the Dominion regarding the policy of the party, and the most and most efficient way of organizing, so

as to insure success in the coming struggle. The outlook for the Liberals is unusually bright at present. The government has so far admitted the reasonableness of their contention in favour of tariff reform as to announce their intention of appointing a commission to ascertain the opinions of the leading men of the country upon this all important question, with a view to amending the tariff to a very considerable degree next session; and Mr. Foster is already upon a tour through the country to feel the pulse of the people. The people have noted this fact, and will have their eyes upon the government at the next session. There is very little expectation of the government renegeing their promises for a tariff reduction beyond a very small degree. Consequently they will have to face this argument at the next election; and it will then have received double force because of their own admissions in its favour. All that the party needs to do is to organize thoroughly, to remodel their policy intelligently, and to fight with all their vigour in the coming struggle, and victory will be theirs.

Joseph Jefferson, the actor, was taken seriously ill in Cincinnati last week. The Bank of England has advanced its rate of discount from 3 per cent to 3 1/2 per cent.

A letter from London, Eng., says Miss Frances Willard's health is entirely broken down. The French chamber of deputies has passed a law requiring all foreigners in France to register.

A wholesale expulsion of Jews has been begun in Poland, according to correspondents from London. The officers of the World's Fair report themselves well satisfied with the attendance on the opening day.

The bill establishing eight hours as a legal day for miners was adopted in the British commons last week by a majority of 88.

The infantas Enlala and the other members of the Spanish royal party who are to visit the United States have arrived at Porto Rico. The Grip Printing and Publishing Co., of Toronto, are asking for tenders for the purchase of the comic newspaper known as Grip.

The German Reichstag has been dissolved, and new elections will take place on June 15. The defeat of the army bill caused the crisis.

Women Physicians at the Fair. The World's fair congress of women physicians is fixed for the week beginning June 19 and ending Saturday noon, June 25. The Illinois state committee will act as hostess. Katharine Miller of Lincoln, chairman of the branch connected with the Queen Isabella association, proposes to keep the medical department of the Isabella clubhouse always open with some members present to receive and make welcome visiting members. Some months ago there was organized an association of women physicians, surgeons and trained nurses to take charge of an emergency hospital during the exposition. Eastern women do not begin yet to appreciate the great work done by these enthusiastic western women. A Brooklyn woman who has just returned from a trip to Chicago says, "I was lukewarm myself until I saw the vast projects which have been carried to successful execution under women's management."

Business and charity have been combined with wonderful foresight. There is the Isabella hotel, for instance, a permanent building of pressed brick with stone trimmings. This building adjoins the Isabella clubhouse and is on one of the main entrances to the fair. It has been arranged that the net proceeds of the hotel shall constitute at the close of the fair a hospital fund to be under the control of women physicians. Such well known women doctors as Lucy Walter, Janet Gunn of the Chicago Hospital for Women and Children and Isadore L. Green have been leading spirits in the medical department.

GAMBLING ON AN EASTERN SCALE. The total receipts from the gaming tables at Monte Carlo during the past year were 24,000,000 francs, and the directors of the gaming society will be able to pay a dividend of about 41 per cent for the year on the nominal value of each share. This is the largest dividend it has ever paid. The present capital of the society is 30,000,000 francs, divided into 60,000 shares. There have been no striking events at the gambling establishment during the past year. No plunger has arisen, and there have been no really big winners. No one has broken the bank. The feature of the season has been the increased multitudes of small gamblers, the class the management most welcomes. They have small capital and can't stand against a run of bad luck. They lose their money rapidly and make room for the next gambler. Monte Carlo has fallen vastly in the social scale during the past year or so.
