NO OFFICIAL MESSAGE FROM ST. VINCENT

Panic-Stricken People Are Flocking to Kingstown-The Scenes in the Island of Martinique.

London, Sept. 6.-The colonial office has received no direct news of the reported further eruption of the Soufriere volcano in the Island of St. Vincent. Yesterday evening a cable message was received from the Island of St. Lucia to the effect that no details of the outbreak were known. 
