

5. THOMAS HARMON.

Brother Thomas Harmon was a native of Connecticut, United States, and was born Oct. 10th, 1783. He left his native land, when a young man, and came to Canada in 1808. He was converted to God Dec. 26th, 1809, and immediately united with the church. He gave early indications of usefulness, and in obedience to the call of God, and in compliance with the decision of the authorities of the church, he commenced soon after his conversion to God, to call sinners to repentance. He received license as an Exhorter in 1810, and Local Preacher's license in 1812. He was a man of strong powers of mind, a clear and logical reasoner, a sound divine, and a powerful preacher. He was called to the more active scenes of life, by engaging in the itinerant work, and unreservedly consecrated himself to God and the services of the church. He was ordained Deacon in 1819 by the late Bishop Roberts of the M. E. Church of the United States, and in 1833 he was ordained a minister by the Rev. George Marsden, President of the Wesleyan Conference in Canada. He had seen much affliction, both personal and domestic, but he was not forgotten of the Lord. During his last illness he suffered much from lowness of spirits, but was sustained by the comforts and consolations of religion. He died at the residence of his son in the Township of Westminster, on the 24th day of July, 1862, and in the 79th year of his age.

6. JAMES MUSGROVE.

Br. Musgrove was a native of Devonshire, England. He was converted to God in the town of Lostwithel, in Cornwall, in the year 1827, at a revival in which several of the Ministers of our Church were made partakers of saving grace.

He was eminently devoted to God, and zealous in His service, and was soon employed as an exhorter.

In 1831 he emigrated to Canada, came to Cobourg, and was in the same year sent by the presiding elder, the Rev. Wm. Ryerson, to the Belleville Circuit, under the superintendency of the Rev. Richard Jones.

Since that time Bro. M. has occupied some of the best Circuits in our work, and filled some of the highest offices in the gift of the Conference; and at the time of his decease he sustained the important position of Co-Delegate, by the suffrages of his brethren and the appointment of the English Conference.
