OFF TO THE SOUTH POLE

Latest British Expedition Sails Under a White Flag.

The latest British expedition towards the South Pole left London recently when the Nimrod sailed from the East India Dock. It was announced that the King and Queen would visit the vessel when it calls at Coves.

The Nimrod is an old vessel, and is well suited for work among the ice. The destination of the vessel is Port Lockroy. These two expeditions will bid farewell to civilization for many months, while the Nimrod, under Captain England, carries on a series of scientific investigations along the ice.

According to present plans it is intended that three of the best party shall go due south to the Pole, three due east, and three along a line between the other two, to be met by the land party which will be ready at the Pole by Christmas 1910, ready for the return of the Nimrod in January, 1911.

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OBITUARY

MR. HUGH MCLEOD

It is with deep regret that we chronicle the death of another one of our aged townsmen. Early Monday morning death claimed Hugh McLeod as its victim. The deceased had been in failing health for some time. He was born at St. George in the year 1839 and consequent was 71 years of age. He lived here the greater part of his life following the carpenter's trade, and for the last few years kept a store. He was highly respected as a citizen. In politics he was a conservative and an adherent of the Baptist church. He is survived by a wife and two sons, Fred at home, and Stuart of Vermont, also one daughter Mrs. Ernest Jackson, of St. George. We extend our sincere sympathy to the bereaved wife and family. The funeral will take place this afternoon.
