

INSULTS TO CANADA IN YANKEE SENATE

Mood in which United States Regards Tariff Shown by Senator Nelson, who Said: "Canadian Reciprocity Might Lead to the Annexation of Canada." -- Another Senator has a Fling at England.

Washington, June 20.—Statements in the Senate today by Senator Hepburn of Idaho that "WHATEVER WE HAVE TAKEN FROM ENGLAND HAS BEEN TAKEN AT THE POINT OF THE BAYONET," produced the only tense moment of today's short debate on the Canadian reciprocity bill. Senator Hepburn's remark, which he later explained extended only to governmental acquisitions, was challenged by Senator Bacon of Georgia, as a "grave matter," in view of the pending arbitration negotiations with England.

"We have more to enjoy that we have received from England than from all the rest of the world put together," said Senator Bacon. Senator Gallinger brought on the controversy by asking if this nation did not owe more to England, in the way of reciprocity, than it did to Canada, because of the free trade market that England had always given to this country, and the rest of the world.

WESTERN GRAIN GROWERS GIVE HEARTY CHEERS FOR R. L. BORDEN'S HONESTY

Conservative Leader Tells Them Plainly that He Would Not Support Reciprocity if they Made Him Premier Today--Brandon Theatre Too Small for Crowds and Mr. Borden Speaks to 4000 People in Public Park.

Brandon, Man., June 20.—Mr. Borden was given another magnificent reception today. The Conservative leader had a strenuous day. This afternoon he addressed a big meeting in Carberry where he received a coronation and this evening he met the grain growers of Brandon and afterwards addressed a great meeting in the public park as the theatre proved too small to accommodate the large number of grain growers.

Mr. Borden's reply to the grain growers, was of a kind which showed more plainly than anything else the sturdy character and the unwavering honesty of the man, and he has made many friends here by his honest dealing with the issues of the day. The grain growers were outspoken in their demands for reciprocity, increase of the British preference to 50 per cent., building of the Hudson Bay road, and remedy of evils in connection with the terminal elevators. They also accused the Conservatives in parliament of obstructing reciprocity and declared that the onus would fall on the Opposition if the government was forced to the country before distribution.

In his reply Mr. Borden said HE WAS ABSOLUTELY OPPOSED TO RECIPROcity, AND IF THE GRAIN GROWERS VOLUNTEERED TO MAKE HIM PREMIER TOMORROW, HE WOULD ABSOLUTELY REFUSE TO ACCEPT THE OFFICE. He said he did not think the grain growers were aware of what total reduction of duties really meant. It had been the experience in the past that the lowering of the tariff did not always mean extra competition. Mr. Borden was well received by the grain growers, who cheered him loudly at the conclusion of his address.

CORONATION BANQUET ODDON FESTIVITIES IN BUCKINGHAM PALACE, LAST NIGHT, ON SCALE OF WONDERFUL GRANDEUR--KINGS, PRINCES AND REPRESENTATIVES OF WORLD'S GREAT POWERS MINGLE IN MAZES OF THE DANCE -- A FUNCTION THAT WILL LIVE IN HISTORY.

London, June 20.—The most regal banquet King of Emperor ever witnessed, and a gorgeous Shakespeare ball under the auspices of noted society leaders stand forth as shining features of the second day of coronation week. The banquet in Buckingham Palace tonight, was a scene of imperial grandeur, so far as the assembly of royal and eminent personages, the setting of costly magnificence and beautiful decorations could combine to make it.

Through the masses navigate every sort of vehicle imaginable, motorcars, buses, drays and carts filled with sightseers, advertising vans with minstrels and donkey wagons driven by costers. St. James' Park and the West End Club region were jammed tonight to suffocation. As the outcome of an appeal by the Duke of Devonshire, to the "gentlemen of England" to realize at the time their responsibilities to the Empire, a meeting was held tonight in Queen's Hall.

CHOLERA IN NEW YORK

Two Cases Discovered on Italian Steamer Which Arrived There Yesterday -- Passengers Quarantined.

New York, June 20.—Two cases of cholera have been discovered among the crew of the steamship Duca degli Abruzzi, in today from Genoa, Naples, and Madeira. Both patients were taken to the pest house on Swan Island and all the steerage passengers will be detained at Hoffman Island for observation.

CITY OF MONTREAL SUED FOR \$50,000

Another Stage Reached in The Recent Seizure of Canned Eggs By The Montreal Food Officers.

Montreal, June 20.—Following a recent decision in the courts in the Chinese egg seizure case, the John Layton Co. of London, Eng., have entered suit for \$50,000 against the city of Montreal, for the seizure of 100,000 worth of canned eggs as unfit for human consumption; but the courts held that the eggs were harmless. The eggs have been kept in cold storage and are now being returned to the owners to be put on the market; but the company claims that since the seizure, the drop in price of eggs and other considerations, have cost it \$50,000.

STRIKE PLAYS HAVOC WITH THE REVIEW PLANS

London, June 20.—The seamen's strike is playing havoc with the plans of those who had arranged to witness the great naval review by King George, at Spithead on Saturday. In addition to the four ocean going vessels of the Union Castle Line, the sailing of which for the naval review was cancelled last night, the Royal Mail Steam Packet Line announced today that it was obliged to withdraw four of their big ships which had been chartered to attend the sea pageant. These eight ships long sold out their entire accommodations for Saturday and thus thousands at the last moment are deprived of the anticipated spectacle.

A HORSE BURNED IN AN EARLY MORNING FIRE

A barn belonging to A. E. Hamilton and located in the rear of his woodworking factory on Erin street was destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning, and one horse was burned to death. The fire broke out at about half past two and before the firemen arrived the barn which was a two-story wooden structure was a mass of flames. The fire spread to a building near by belonging to Mr. McKivis, but a stream was turned on and the blaze was extinguished before much damage was done.

MONTREAL STRIKERS RETURNED TO WORK

Montreal, June 20.—The strike in the Canadian Car Company's plants at Dominion and Tarron, was called off this morning, the men returning to work unconditionally. Two thousand employees went out six days ago for a two cent an hour increase. The company refused to consider the demand.

GOVERNMENT WILL RATIFY DECLARATION OF LONDON

London, June 20.—Premier Asquith made it plain in the House of Commons this afternoon that the British government intended, despite all protests from the British admirals, ship owners and Chambers of Commerce, to pass through the ratification of the Declaration of London, the International agreement covering prizes in naval warfare.
