## STEAMER KANAWHA.

The steamer Kanawha sailed at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon from Halifax for St. John.

## THE ALLAN LINE.

The steamer Hesperian was two hundred miles east of Bellefleur at 9 a. m. yesterday and is due at Quebec Friday night and Montreal Saturday night.

The steamer Victorian arrived at Liverpool at 6 a. m. yesterday and the steamer Scotian arrived at Havre at 8 p. m. Tuesday.

## BUOY IN BEACON'S PLACE.

The beacon light and fog bell which is sooth to be removed will be replaced by a gas and bell buoy, painted black showing an occulting white light. This will be moved at the outer end of the bar at once as the work of dismantling the beacon commences. This buoy will be moved as the dredging progresses, so that it will show the limit of width available for navigation. In the government advertisement of the proposed change an error occurred and the fact that there would be a bell on the buoy was omitted. The dredges are now working very close to the beacon and before long will so undermine the earth that it will fall.

## NEW TUG LAUNCHED.

There was launched from the Staten Island Shipbuilding Co's yard a few days ago the tug W. B. Kenna, built for the Hilton-Dodge Co. of Savannah, Ga. The tug measures 150 feet in length, 27 1/2 feet beam, 15 feet deep, and cost about \$100,000. She will be placed in commission next month in the Atlantic coast towing trade. Her special work will be in connection with the towing of a fleet of seven or more barges which the Hilton-Dodge concern have had built at the Harlan & Hollingsworth yard at Wilmington, Del., several of which have already been launched. It is understood the lumber company propose using them in bringing lumber from the south to Boston, Portland, Providence and other eastern ports, taking the place of the numerous schooners they have under charter all the time. The barges have a carrying capacity of about 800,000 feet of hard pine lumber, and it is said one of them will be employed exclusively in bringing lumber to this port. This is a decided innovation in the carrying trade and the success of the experiment will be watched with interest. Deep concern by all interested in the shipping industry.

Bremen, July 22.—Stmr Friedrich der Grosse (Ger.), which arrived at St. John from New York, reports having bunched on fire while at sea; the fire has been extinguished. Damage apparently slight.

Provincetown, Mass., Aug. 4.—Schr. James Young, from Kennebec for New York, with lumber, put into here today leaking badly.

## DANGERS TO NAVIGATION.

Steamer Santa Marta (Br.), reports July 12, lat 26 01 N, lon 74 12 W, passed the roof of a ship's house about 50 feet square.

Steamer Mascotte reports July 23, in Key West Harbor main ship channel, about 50 feet on the channel side on a line between Whitehead Ship Shoal-buoys Nos. 6 and 8, and about half way between these buoys, passed two dangerous pilings 9 inches in diameter, 6 feet apart, in about 30 feet of water, slanting about 30 degrees from perpendicular, showing 3 feet above water.

Steamer Prinz Adalbert (Ger.), reports July 25 passed a wreck about 150 feet long, covered with barnacles, in lat 41 37 N, lon 50 08 W; July 26, lat 41 20 N, lon 55, saw an upright mast with wreckage attached.

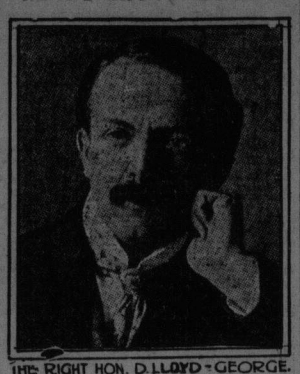

ABOLISH THE LORDS,  
PLEADS LLOYD GEORGE

THE RIGHT HON. D. LLOYD GEORGE.

An appeal to democracy against the House of Lords was reiterated by David Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

"The Premier has already announced that next year he will introduce a measure for a new second chamber," he said. "It will be a chamber in which all parties and all sections and all creeds will have equal treatment."

"Under the present system Liberal governments would have no powers by and by except such as the Lords vouchsafed to them. A Liberal Premier would have to go around to Belgrave and ask the butler to tell him his lord's orders for the day."
