New Glasgow, N. S., Jan. 27.—In the Independent Hockey League game here tonight, New Glasgow defeated Amherst, 5 to 4. Successful Season For English Sire

Bend Or's Position is Undisputed as Premier in the List of Ten Great English Sires.

London, Jan. 26.—(By Canadian Press.)—By winning 522 races, valued at approximately \$1,082,500 during the 1931 flat racing season, that branch of the English thoroughbred which traces its pedigree back to the great Bend Or, the winner of the Derby in 1830, has again firmly enthroned the Bend Or line in the premier position in the list of ten great English sires. Bend Or's position is undisputed and far outdistances the remainder of the field, doubling in the amount of winnings last year the strain of horses that takes its name from St. Simon, the second in the list.

The Bend Or line had a most successful season last year increasing its winnings by some \$119,000 over the previous year, with earnings exceeding the million dollar mark—approximately \$1,082,500. The St. Simon line suffered somewhat of a setback, however, and the earnings fell off from \$747,700 in 1930 to \$526,000 in 1931, but managed to retain a considerable margin over the second property third in the list with earnings of \$573,000 an increase of \$14,500 over the 1930 season. The Amphion line, in fourth place, also showed an improvement over 1930, with winnings of \$332,500, an increase of some \$30,000. The Hampton line in fifth place had a poorer season last year than in 1930 and winnings dropped from \$187,500 in 1930 to \$143,500 in 1931.

The above five lines hold the same relative position for 1931 as in the preceding year, but some changes in the remaining five is noted. Rockland replaces Le Samarin in 6th place, with \$127,500 earned, while Queens Birthday line, which was 6th in 1930, jumped from tenth to 7th place. Le Samarin, sixth in 1930, dropped back to 8th last year with winnings of \$121,500. Carbine occupies 9th place, the same position as in 1930, with winnings of \$102,300 to its credit while tenth and last place goes to Bercaldine with \$91,000. This is a step backward for Bercaldine line from the eighth place it held in 1930.

The Bend Or and St. Simon lines were both represented in the published lists by sixty sires whose offspring were victorious during the past year. The Olympe sons and grandsons had a very successful season of which the Polyemus branch furnished a wonderful list, with winnings approximately \$573,500 going to the credit of the Bend Or line. For the St. Simon line the Desmond branch was responsible for nearly \$160,000 in prize money. The Isomony sires are now practically all descendants of Isinglass and Gallinule. Swynford, John O'Garra and Harry of Hereford were the chief Isinglass representatives, with the Swynford's winnings placed at \$143,000 and the Gallinule clan won \$155,700. The Amphion line's chief dependance was placed almost entirely on the son of Old Soudridge, of which Sanstar, through the winnings of the great Otago an Bran, totalling over \$75,000 during the year—looked the head of the poll. The Hampton line barely laid its own last year, but expectations are held out for this line by the promising two year old Gay Crusader and Gainsborough and it is possible the Hampton may not be a much needed flip in 1932.
