The institution is now on a basis which enables it to fully carry out this most proper and meritorious object. Whatever may be said of English traits which do not strike foreigners pleasantly, this much must be confessed, that in actual deeds of charity and mutual help

they are simply unsurpassable. Such a project as this is no longer mooted than it becomes a success as a matter of course. The English are liberal with their money and their time; if it depended on hospitals, asylums and "homes," on "houses of refuge" and "funds" and charitable retreats to abolish crime and poverty from London, it would be done. Slow in political and, perhaps, in social progress, they are prompt and quick and generous to the unfortunate. The more I see of them, the more I am convinced of this; and surely it is a trait which redeems a hundred snobberies and a thoudeems a hundred snobberies and a thousand growls. Many poor fellows who have played a losing game with the pen, who have caught consumption in the who have caught consumption in the sanctum, or have broken down, perhaps by a reckless Bohemian career, have been saved from deeper degradation by this very fund. It is admirably managed, and nothing is easier than for its committee both to find out meritorious cases and ascertain whether applicants are deserving of their assistance. You must remember, too, that in London the newspaper writer has no object before him except the winning of his daily bread. A man so rarely wins reputation on the press that it may be said never to happen. He is and must be anonymous. Nobody

has any idea, for instance, who writes this or that leader in the *Times* or the News or the Standard. So if he fails, he fails very likely utterly. DRAMATIC AND LITERARY CHARITIES. The unfortunate of the press are not alone deriving benefit from a charitable organization. There are two others very similar, the "Literary Fund" and the "Dramatic Fund," which names clearly designate their objects. The Literary Fund is really one of the most admirable of London institutions, and no

Disraeli have lent their presence as chairmen at its annual dinners, and no one can tell what a blessing it has been to disappointed, decayed, exhausted and aged authors. It is not unknown that John Pool, the author of "Paul Pry," owed very much—perhaps escape from penury—to the annual pension granted to him from the now happily ample literary fund. Indeed, subscriptions pour in about as fast as mency is needed; a check for £100 from some noble marquis, or some famous novelist or historian is by no means an uncommon wind all to its trassify. You are aware that there is a government provision for pensioning authors. This is from the 'Civil List," and is supposed to be used for the deserving impecunious only. But in fact it is not confined to these. Harrison Ainsworth, the novelist, Mr. S. C. Hall and many others enjoy civil list pensions, of sums varying from £50 to £400 annually, who are far from being in want of pecuniary assistance. These pensions seem really to be given rather for literary merit than for charity; although in the case of some, Leigh Hunt for example, it was charitable as well as appreciative. The "Literary Fund" is supplementary to the Civil list, and between the two, broken down scribblers fare, as you may imagine, very well. The days of Grub street writing are by no means over yet. True, there are more prizes in the literary field, but the con-

means over yet. True, there are more prizes in the literary field, but the contestants have waxed a hundred fold. Besides, London literary Bohemia is the most Bohemian of all Bohemias; the

young writers lead, very generally, a life at which even a Paris student from the Latin Quarter would stand aghast. And there is physical and mental ruin in this Bohemian hurly-burly. The region round about Convent Garden and the Tavistook is full of seedy writers, some of whom win a precarious existence by hunting up news for the papers, others write novelettes for such sensational weeklies as the London Journal, and others are forever engaged on some magnum opus which too often never sees the light. One week the Bohemian's pocket rattles with sovereigns; the next. like Johnson and Dick Savage, he is glad to sup off a crust in the garet. ANTIQUATED ACTORS. The merriest of all the annual dinners
