## Bosnitch sparks SRC

The mood of this week's SRC meeting was set by Engineering Rep Mr. John Bosnitch as he read a letter from a UNB student, Susan Neill, asking about the Perry Thorbourne issue.

Motion was given by Mr. Bosnitch and Mr. Barrett, "That the SRC request repayment of the loan of \$2,284.97 owed the council by former president Perry Thorbourne within one year. If payment is not received by then, interest should be charged at the prime rate."

A second motion was handled by the same people to table the motion so that councillors could examine all the information handed out by Bosnitch concerning the Perry Thorbourne issue.

The motion was defeated 11-2-4 it required a 2!3 majority. Motion 3 was presented by councillors Fraser, Dickson, and Derek McDorman "Be it resolved that Mr. Perry Thorbourne receive \$2,284.97 in payment for services rendered for 1980." Mr. Bosnitch at that time gave a detailed iteration of the situation at hand and concluded his statement by saying that the money belongs to the students and it was up to the council to collect the money. The motion was carried 8-7-2, and the loan was annulled.

Various points of order were

brought up on the two!three majority votes and an explanation of abstentions was read from the Roberts Rules of Order.

The financial report was given and reviews by Mr. Weatherhead, Auditor. A subsequent motion to accept his financial statement of the union was carried unanimous-

In normal business of the council, an administration secretary has been approved and Mrs. Judy MacKay has been ratified for the position. Strong points were made in favor and against of having an administrative secretary. It Various councillors said comwas the opinion of Councillor puter time should not be used Tim MacKay and observer Randy MacDonald that an administrative advisor is essential at SRC meetings. President Ratcliff replied that if coun-

cillors were better prepared for meetings and knew the constitution and Roberts Rules of Order that the chairman should be sufficient to answer questions.

Another motion was brought before council asking that they present a letter to the senate recommending "that the allocation of computer time to faculty be reviewed and all increases be reserved strictly for direct use by students." Councillor Dickson said the computer center allocates time if it sees fit and that it was pompous of the SRC to tell them how to run their business. solely by CS students but for all students as opposed to faculty.

The by-election and referendum date has been set for Monday, November 16.
