The Government also suggests that the Canadian people establish their own home gardens wherever possible. By individual and joint efforts of this kind much can be done to add to our food supply. To the extent that we can do this, particularly in the provision of alternative foods to wheat and other grain foodstuffs we will be able to release more wheat for export.

(6) Reduction of Inventories

The Government believes that flour stocks, both those held by dealers and by consumers, are in many cases higher than is necessary and that reduction of stocks on hand can take place without seriously disturbing the supply of flour and flour products to the Canadian people. The reduction of inventories wherever possible is strongly urged.

Transportation regulations restricting shipments to carload lots, while necessary in wartime to ensure efficient use of limited transportation facilities, have reportedly had the effect of causing unnecessary shipments of flour to dealers. The Government hopes to modify these regulations so that unnecessary domestic shipments of flour and feed can be reduced.

(7) Reduction in Domestic Milling

The Government has also decided that in order to
