## "Thoughts Upon Methodism.

"1. I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid, lest they should exist only as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power. And this undoubtedly will be the case, unless they hold fast both the doctrine, spirit and discipline with which they first set out.

"2. What was their fundamental doctrine? That the Bible is the whole and sole rule both of Christian faith and practice. Hence they learned, (1) That religion is an inward principle; that it is no other than the mind that was in Christ, or in other words, the renewal of the soul after the image of God, in righteourness and true holiness; (2) That this can never be wrought in us, but by the power of the Holy Ghost; (3) That we receive this, and every other blessing, merely for the sake of Christ; and, (4) That who-
