

- NOMA,** an old English coin, worth at first 6s. 8d., later 10s.
- NULLIFIDIAN,** an unbeliever
- ONSTRAD,** a farm-steading
- ORLANDO,** the hero of Ariosto's romantic epic
- OUTFIELD AND INFIELD.** Land constantly manured and cultivated was called 'in-field'; land cropped, without manure, until exhausted, 'outfield'
- OUTSHOT,** a projecting addition to a building
- OUT-TAKEN,** excepting
- OVERTON, RICHARD,** Leveller and pamphleteer (1642-80), was imprisoned in Newgate for attacking the House of Lords
- Owsen,** oxen
- PADUASOV,** a lady's habit made of Padua silk
- PARENT,** a kinswoman
- PARRICK,** porridge
- PATON OF MAUDOWHEAD,** an Ayrshire Covenanter, distinguished himself in the German wars and at the battle of Worcester; he was executed after Bothwell Brig
- PEARLINGS,** a kind of lace, made of thread or silk
- PEAT-HAG,** a hollow in a moor left from digging peats
- PEEL-HOUSE,** a small fortified house, or tower
- PRIME FORTE ET DURE,** stern necessity
- PENNY-PER,** wages
- PENTLAND HILLS, SATTLE OF,** or **RULLION GREEN,** where in 1660 General Dalziel defeated the Galloway Cameronians
- PERDO,** hidden
- PICKLE,** a small quantity, little bit
- PINNER AND PEARLINGS,** caps and laces
- PUT,** to put
- PIT AND GALLows,** PRIVILEGE OF, the right to inflict capital punishment — to drown women in a pit and to hang men on a gallows
- PLACK,** 1d penny
- PLEINISMING,** furnishing
- PLEUNIE-PAIDLE,** a stick for clearing earth from the plough
- POCKMANTLE,** portmanteau
- POCK-PUDDING,** a Scotchman's contemptuous epithet for an Englishman
- PORT ROYAL,** the port of Kingston in Jamaica
- PUAS,** a secret hoard, treasure
- PURS,** to push
- PUL,** to pull
- PUL,** a pool
- PUSCH, THA DEVIL, AND THE BAGAS,** an allusion to the popular puppet-plays of the day
- PUND SCOTS,** ls. 8d.
- QUAIS,** shallow drinking-cup
- QUAN,** a young woman
- RACE OF DUNBAR.** See Dunbar
- RANDY, SANDIE,** a scold, brawler; disorderly, vagrant
- RAPLUCH,** coarse, undyed homespun
- RAX,** to stretch, reach
- RENDRE,** an adviser, settler of disputes, peacemaker
- REW,** smoke
- REYING,** thieving
- RENT-MAH,** a pecuniary for rent
- REEST,** to harbour, entertain
- RIG,** a ridge of land; field
- RUM,** to search, examine
- ROUND,** to whisper
- ROUT,** to bellow
- ROW,** to roll, wrap
- RUE,** TO TAKE THA, to rue, repent a proposal, intention
- RUGGING,** pulling, scuffling
- RUGLEN,** Rutherglen, on the Clyde, 2 miles from Glasgow
- RUTHVEN, SIR PATRICK,** sometime governor of Ulm, on the Danube, afterwards Earl of Fife and Bradford
- SAB,** so
- ST. JOHNSTONE'S TIPPET,** a halter
- SAB,** sore, very
- SAN BENITOS,** robes worn by the victims of the Inquisition, and cut like those worn by the monks of St. Benedict (San Benito)
- SANCTUM SANCTORUM,** holy of holies, a very jealously kept apartment
- SARG,** a shirt
- SAUT,** salt
- SCAFF AND RAFF,** tag-rag and bobtail
- SCALED,** cleaned the inside of a cannon by firing a small charge from it
- SCAU,** a steep bank
- SCOTS MILE,** nearly 9 furlongs
- SCOTS SHILLINGS,** equivalent to English pennies
- SCRAUCH,** a long harangue
- SCUPPLA, or SCUPPLAY, MILLIN,** ds, an amiable but long-winded and extravagant writer of romances, *Grand Cyrus* (10 vols., 1849-63), etc., which enjoyed great popularity in their day
- SCUTS,** becomes, suits
- SHAMINA,** are not ashamed
- SHAMOY,** chamois
- SHAW,** a wood, flat ground at the bottom of a hill
- SHKELING-HILL,** a mound where grain was shelled or winnowed by hand in the open air
- SHUFFLAH, JOHN,** Duke of Buckinghamshire, commanded a force sent in 1640 to the relief of Tauniers, then an English possession and besieged by the Moors
- SHILLINGS SCOTS,** equal to English pennies
- SIRUA D'URF,** author of *Astree* and other romances
- SILENCE, MARTA.** See Master Silence
- SINGLE CARTRON,** Single or Shorter Catechism of the Church of Scotland
- SINGLE SUBOGA,** a private soldier
- SIN' KYNG,** since

- SKELL,** skill
- SKELV,** knowing, skillful
- SKELLIA,** to squint
- SKELPING,** beating, thrashing; trotting, cantering
- SKINAS,** one who serves out liquor
