In this volume, as in the previous one, there are introduced some new features which I feel convinced will prove very acceptable to the practical student and well repay him for any extra trouble in reading or extra cost in procuring. A second preface to this volume, further than a simple announcement of its existence as a second edition of Vol. II of "The Steel Square and Its Uses," would seem an unnecessary labor, as the long preface in the volume of the first edition covers the entire ground, and, as a rule, the operative workman does not take much stock in a long-winded preamble.
