PEMBROKE, ONT.—Alex. Barr is preparing to build a new carriage factory, of cement blocks.—The County Council will build a concrete bridge over the Waba creek, cost \$2,500.

CLINTON, ONT.—Tenders for factory building for the Clinton Knitting Co. will be received by H. B. Combe up to 20th inst. Plans by Stewart, Witten & Taylor, architects, Brantford.

EDMONTON, N.W.T.—George Hutton intends building a livery and sales stable.—It is expected that work will be commenced within three weeks on the new Canadian Northern station.

BARRIE, ONT.—Thos. Kennedy, architect, will receive tenders up to Saturday, 15th inst., for carpenter work of a pair of semi-detached houses for E. T. Tyrer, also a pair for P. J. Moore, to be erected in this town.

QU'APPELLE, N.W.T.—J. C. Starr, Secretary-Treasurer, has invited architects to submit plans by July 26 for a town hall 40 x 60 feet, two stories and basement, building to be of brick with stone foundation.

ST. CATHARINES, ONT.—The ratepayers, by a large majority, have decided in favor of granting a free site to the Jenckes Machine Co., of Sherbrooke, Que. Work on the building will be commenced immediately.

OTTAWA, ONT.—B. J. Hurdenburg and Bradford L. Gilbert, architects, of New York, have been engaged to prepare plans for a million dollar hotel to be built on the site of the Grand Union in this city. Promoters, J. Paisley, A. F. McLaren, M.P., Hugh Fleming and others.

RAYMOND, N.W.T.—Frank Fairbanks proposes building a business block on Broadway.—The Bank of Montreal purpose proceeding at once with erection of their building, which will be two

stories, brick veneer, hot water heating, cost \$15,000.—The Raymond Mill & Elevator Co. intend building an elevator.

LONDON, ONT.—The Presbytery of London have decided to take steps to establish a church at Chelsea Green.—By-laws have been passed providing for a number of local improvements, including a vitrified brick pavement on Talbot street, from King to Fullarton.

WINGHAM, ONT.—By-laws were carried here last week to raise \$12,000 by debentures for improving and extending the waterworks system, also fixing the assessment of the Canada Furniture Co.'s property at \$20,000 for a period of ten years, in consideration of which the company will erect an addition to their factory 64 x 70 feet.

FORT FRANCES, ONT.—The plans for the town hall are being modified so as to reduce the cost.—Tenders for waterworks system will be invited at an early date.—W. G. Breckon and W. E. Fraleigh are negotiating for sites on which to build.—The Canadian Bank of Commerce will build on the corner of Church and Mowat streets.

PARIS, ONT.—The Town Council may co operate with a private company in piping natural gas from the wells at Attercliffe, near Dunnville.—The Penman Manufacturing Co. are having plans prepared for extensive additions and improvements.—Work will shortly be commenced on the G.T.R. station.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—The tenders received by the town for construction of cement sidewalks were considered too high and the work may be done by day labor. Sewers may also be constructed by day work.—The ratepayers of Sarawak Township last week carried a by-law to raise \$2,000 for building a steel and cement bridge over the Indian river at Nelson's mill.

MEAFORD, ONT.—Rev. W. F. Price will receive tenders up to 15th inst. for erection of Baptist church.—Tenders will be received by R. Agnew, Secretary of the Meaford and St. Vincent Agricultural Society, up to July 14th. Plans and specifications at his office, Meaford, or at the office of Thos. Kennedy, archi-

tect, Barrie.—The Council have decided to submit a by-law to the ratepayers to raise funds to purchase an electric light plant and pumping machinery.

VICTORIA, B.C.—It is understood that a local architect is preparing plans for a brick block to be built on Government street for Oscar Promis, of San Jose, Cal., to be 45x140 feet, two stories, containing stores and offices.—J. C. M. Keith has taken tenders on a residence at Goldstream for James Phair.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—George Hateley has just taken tenders on erection of a rectory for Grace church.—The proposed works of the Heinz Pickle Co. will be built opposite the T.H. & B. freight sheds.—The Dominion Natural Gas Co. are seeking a franchise here.—G. W. Hall, architect, is taking tenders up to 14th inst. for additions and alterations to Y.W.C.A. building.

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT.—The Hospital Committee have accepted the plans of E. D. Pitt, architect, for the proposed first building of the General Hospital, which is to cost about \$18,000. Construction will proceed as soon as working plans can be prepared. Mr. Pitt is also completing the plans for new chemical works to be built at South River for the Standard Chemical Co., to be mainly in solid concrete, with timber and steel roof; five buildings in all, with main buildings 182 x 50 feet and 74 feet wide.

ST. JOHN, N.B.—The highest tender received for the city's loan of \$500,000 at 3½ per cent. is 88.35, which is not likely to be accepted.—Gilmour Brown, C.E., has finished his inspection of the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Co.'s line and will immediately submit to the Government his report on improvements.—The Penobscus Natural Sulphur Spring Co. has been organized by Samuel Watson and W. O. Tewson, both of this city. They have acquired a natural spring near Penobscus and have purchased land at Springdale on which to build a summer hotel.

VANCOUVER, B.C.—G. W. Grant, architect, has submitted to the City Council plans for an Isolation Hospital,

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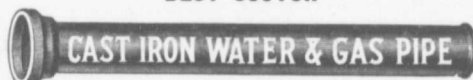
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
