

### LATEST ACT IN GOODISON WHITE-WASHING DRAMA

Dear Sir,—Please allow me space to expose the latest dodge of the "People's Party" in an attempt to continue the "Goodison Whitewashing," and in a crooked way absolve him from a little of the "guilt" of giving away the grants in roads, wells, etc., at Victoria.

Ridgeway, chaplain to No. 3 Canadian General Hospital, France. Here are its contents:—"Dear Mr. White,—Your son William W. White, is in this hospital, and is getting on splendidly. He was wounded in the head, but fortunately, it has not produced any unfavorable results, except slight paralysis of the head, and it is disappear-


ing. There is nothing to worry about, as he is having the best of care, is quite out of danger, and will be quite well again. (Signed) R. W. Ridgeway."

I expect he will be able to have another go at the Huns before it is over. We are a small family of three, who are fit to fight, and two are doing their bit. If every harbor and cove in Newfoundland could boast only of two there would be a few more fighting for a righteous cause.
