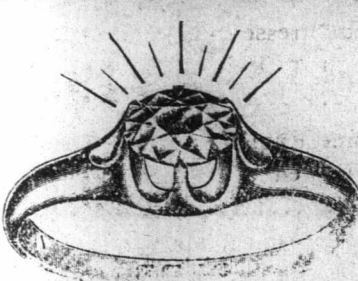

through a joist. He was reported to-
day to be doing fairly well, although
the complications which developed
were very painful.

Just for Fun.

Shortly after 11 o'clock this morn-
ing the central fire department were
called to West Brantford. A boy,
whose name has been secured, was
responsible for a fire in the dump be-
hind the corporation yard. There was
no effort made to put the fire out, as
it was doing no harm. The name of
the boy who turned in the alarm was
also secured.

The New Railway.

A trip from Galt to Brantford over
the Grand Valley Railway at this time
of the year is most enjoyable, and the
traveller is given an opportunity of
seeing the work of construction of the
Lake Erie & Northern Railway. The
progress made by the contractors
along the line has been wonderful. At
this end of the line more work has
been accomplished than further south,
but in the vicinity of Brantford the
contractors are pushing things along
rapidly. Johnson Bros' camp at Mc-
Pherson's farm below the river has
been enlarged considerably, and good
progress is being made on this stretch
with the steam shovel. There is great
activity all along the line from Galt to
Brantford. Below Brantford it is re-
ported that excellent progress is also
being made, and at present at Simcoe
a steam shovel is in operation making
a 30-foot cutting. The promoters of
the line expect to be running trains
from Brantford to Galt this fall, but
there is a lot of work to be done yet—
Galt Reporter.

Coal Goes Up.

The price of hard coal yesterday
advanced 50 cents a ton and is now
\$7.50. It is expected that it will be \$8
per ton by Sept. 1.

Board of Works.

A short meeting of the members
of the board of works was held in
the mayor's office yesterday after-
noon. The board decided that it was
in the best interest of the city that
a number of sanitary sewers, storm
sewers, curbs and gutters be built
and that the work be gone on with
at once.

Local Improvement Work.

It has been found necessary to cut
down the estimate for local improve-
ment work from \$125,000 to \$100,000.
This will mean, it is stated, that there
will be no permanent pavement put
down during the present year. The
work will be confined to what is really
necessary in the way of walks, sewers
and flood prevention. Municipalities
all over Ontario are experiencing the
greatest difficulty in disposing of de-
bentures.

Successful Band Concert.

The Band Concert rendered by the
Dufferin Rifles band in "Sunshine
Park" on the brow of Terrace Hill
was very largely attended. Judging
from the crowd which congregated
around the band stand, there is a
full grown town on the hill. Con-
ductor Johnson was forced to give
encores. And youngsters! They were
there in droves all sizes, sexes, and
ages. One Terrace Hill resident
said there were 60 "kids" in the
square block. The music furnished
by the band was very much appre-
ciated, judging by the hearty applause
given the band.

held at their club rooms in the
Temple building on Friday night, the
new sword, which have been pro-
cured by the exertions of Sir Knight
and Prelate Lambden and his com-

sword drill and hope that it may lead
to greater interest being taken by all
members with consequent augmen-
tation of new members.
