## LETTER FROM THE FRONT

Mr. George Olney of the Grand Valley Hotel, has received the following letter from his brother in England, a soldier of the East Yorks Regiment, now wounded, and in hospital in American Women's Hospital. He is one of a family of five now on active service.  
"No doubt by the time that you receive this letter, you will have learned that I have been wounded. I am very sorry that I have not written to you before now informing you of the fact. Well, to tell you the truth, I hardly knew how to break the news gently. I knew it would upset you and mother very much. I ask you not to worry for my sake as well as your own. Well, lad, you will see by the above that I am in England, and also being treated splendidly by the above society. Before the war broke out, the hospital was the country seat of Mr. Singer, the well known machine maker. I have enclosed a p.c. of the above so that you will be able to see for yourself what sort of a place it is. The cross indicates the ward I am in. Well Geo. I am in the best of health and spirits, and my wound is getting on splendid, and if all goes well I hope to be out within two or three weeks. Harry has said that he was anxious to get up to the front, but I am afraid he will soon want to come down again, especially when he gets some of those Jack Johnsons bursting over his head. I shall be very pleased when it is all over, for it is not a war, it is simply a murder, more so, now that the Germans are using those gases. It is simply terrible to see the agony of these poor fellows in the hospital that have been gassed by the Germans. Well, I must bring this short note to a close, hoping you will excuse the scribbling as I am laying down writing. So with best wishes to all at home, I remain your loving and affectionate brother.

## Brides in Bath Case Up Again

London, June 25.—The trial of George Joseph Smith, indicted on the charge of having murdered his three wives by drowning them in a bath tub, entered its second stage to-day, the evidence relating to the death of Beatrice Mundy, one of the three victims, having been completed. The last witness in this connection was a Portsmouth banker, who testified that the prisoner had opened an account in the name of Smith with money which was obtained out to the name of "Williams" from the sale of Beatrice Mundy's estate, according to testimony.  
"We now begin the Alice Burnham story," remarked the trial judge, alluding to the second alleged victim.  
The first witness on this phase of the case was a Southsea insurance agent. The testimony ran on to show that it was that place that Smith was introduced to Miss Burnham, who promptly took out \$5,000 worth of life insurance which she said was for the benefit of her mother.  
"Next day," said the witness, "Smith married Miss Burnham."  
Six weeks later, according to the witness, Smith wrote to him announcing that his wife had died in her bath. Smith subsequently visited him and produced his wife's will, whereupon the witness expressed surprise because

Smith had told him a few days previously that he would not allow his wife to make a will. Smith told him that he also was surprised when he found the will after her death. The will, said the witness, left everything to Smith.

The next witness was dressed in khaki. He was Dr. Burrows, now of the Army Medical Corps, who arrived from the fighting line to testify that he had examined Miss Burnham for insurance and that he had found her to be a first-class risk. Dr. Burrows is returning immediately to France.
