SEVENTY LOST AT SEA

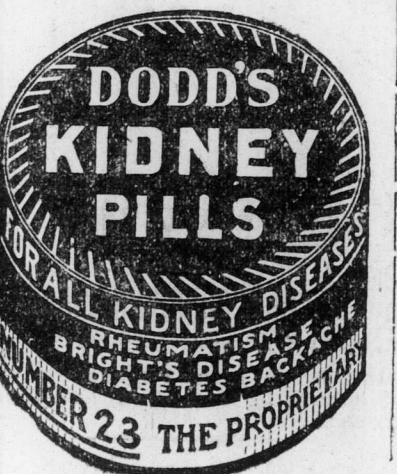
Waterford, Ireland, Feb. 11.—All Waterford is in mourning as the result of the biggest catastrophe that has befallen this Irish east-coast city in thirty years through the loss of seventy of its men at sea. The victims were in two steamers, which left an English port, but were never heard from again. They left 400 women and children so destitute here that relief funds have been started in all parts of the country.

SHIPS THAT DEFY U-BOAT ATTACK

ONE NOW AT U. S. PORT Steamer Can Remain Afloat It is Contended, With 30-Foot Hole in Side

New York, Feb. 10.—Means have been found to make troop transports unsinkable by submarine, according to a statement made to-night by William L. Saunders, vice-chairman of the Naval Consulting Board, in an address at dinner of the University of Pennsylvania Alumni in this city.

Mr. Saunders said that one of the ships recently commandeered by the port and in such shape that she cannot be sunk by an exploding torpedo. "I can conceive of no reason why this information should be withheld," he added. "On the contrary, I believe it is well that every man may come to realize that the time has been reached when American transports are ready for the transportation of our troops which they cannot sink. This ship may have a hole thirty or forty feet in diameter blown in her side, and she would remain afloat. Such a hole would waterlog but one-tenth of the honeycomb air-tight cells.

To Eliminate Submarines.

Washington, D.C., Feb. 10.—Announcement by the Vice-Chairman of the Naval Consulting Board, that means had been found to make troopships practically unsinkable lends new meaning to the air of confidence with which both American and British naval authorities are facing their task of clearing the seas of U-boats. Recent statements by Admiral Jellicoe, formerly First Sea Lord of the British Admiralty, by Secretary Daniels and other officials, have indicated that a campaign has been mapped out and the instrumentalities developed which are expected to crush if not eliminate the submarines entirely within the next few months.

Discussion of the devices developed is being held by officials here. Investigations and experiments have been guarded closely. High officials have been free to assert privately, however, their belief that the U-boats would be checked sufficiently by early summer to insure a steady flow of American troops and supplies to Europe with few incidents such as that of the Tessania to be anticipated.

Back of Baker's Statement.

Admiral Jellicoe went further than any other official by predicting that the submarines would be "killed" by August. At the same time, however, he warned that heavy ship losses were to be expected up to that time. Secretary Baker has insisted before the Senate Committee that a million and a half American troops be taken to France and kept supplied during 1918. His replies to the question as to where the tonnage for the task was to come from have indicated that there was some information at hand which he did not care to disclose.

Without disclosing any of the new implements that may have been developed to meet the submarine menace, many officials have pointed out that all the lines of attack started when the United States entered the war are now on the point of bearing fruit. Additional destroyers and patrol craft are being begun to come forward rapidly. In some cases more than a year's time has been saved in destroyer construction. Swifter, more heavily armed vessels, fitted with every device that has been evolved, are being rushed to the support of Vice-Admiral Sims' flotilla.

PEACE WAS SIGNED

Continued from Page One national powers of our people we must now divert all of our strength to do our part to bring about a new era and a new birth. We are firmly persuaded that we conclude this peace in the interests of great democratic masses, and that this peace will contribute to the general termination of the great war. We gladly state here that the long, hard labor performed at Brest-Litovsk has been crowned with success and that we have attained a democratic peace honorable to both parties. From today the Ukrainian peoples republic is born to new life and it enters as an independent state the circle of nations. It ends war on its front and it will see to it that all of the powers, which in it lie, will rise to new life and flourish.

"Dr. von Kuehman then invited the representatives to sign the peace treaty. At one minute before two o'clock Dr. von Kuehmann as the first signatory signed a copy of the treaty prepared for Germany and by 2:20 o'clock all of the signatures appeared."

The treaty is entitled: "A treaty of peace between Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey on one part and the Ukrainian peoples republic on the other." The preamble states that the Ukrainian people, having in the course of the present world war, declared itself to be independent and expressed a wish to restore peace between itself and the powers at war. Russia desires to take the first step toward a lasting world's peace, honorable to all parties, which shall not only put an end to the horrors of war, but also lead to the restoration of friendly relations of the peoples in political, legal, economic and in-
