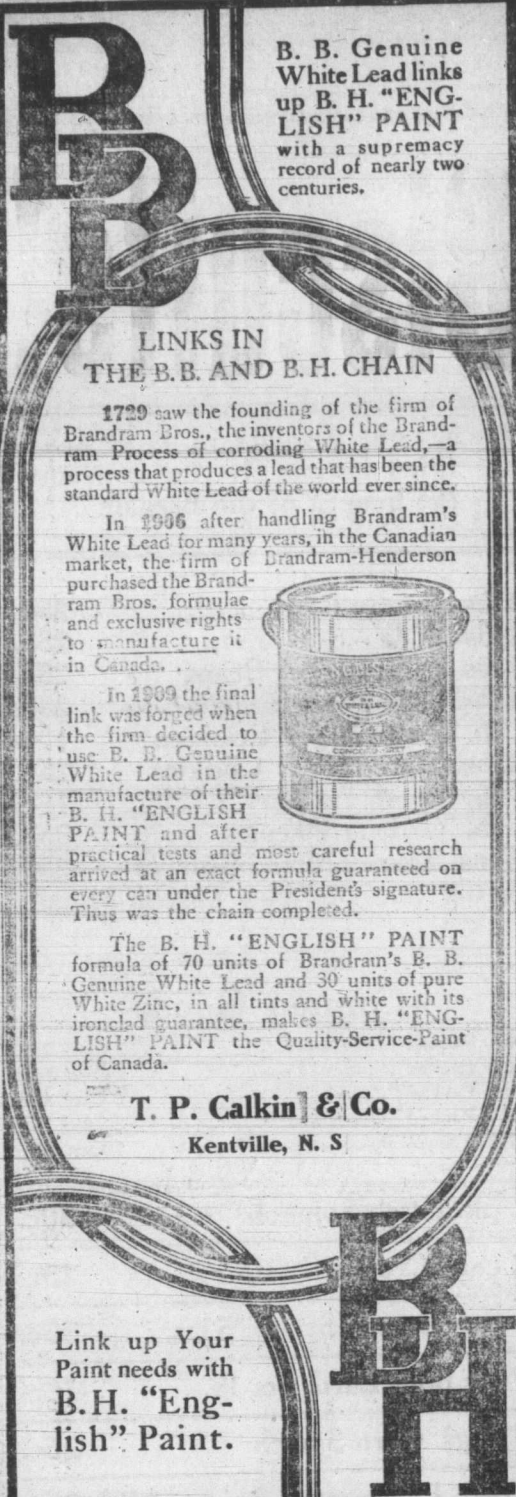

I. B. Oakes, Esq.,
Dear Sir: My open letter was in the Liberal Association, you answered it personally and I reply to your letter in the same way.

In regard to the Association I consider that I was quite within my rights in addressing the President. You think I should have done so by the Secretary, different from the usual ones, in the resolution referred to, was not mentioned in the report, our representative here, recommended the appointment of additional magistrates. If the foundation crumbles the whole structure falls to the ground. Is this assumption true or false? I leave it for those who know the state of temperance matters in the County to say.

In closing I will ask you, Dr. Oakes, if you personally approve of the action of our representatives in insisting upon having my commission taken from me, without an investigation which I asked for?



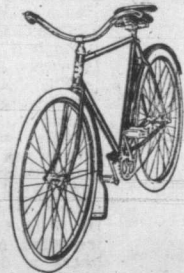

Mrs. Bert Jenkins, of Mount Hope Place, East Dedham, daughter of Mrs. Joseph Arnburg, of Wolfville, formerly of Kentville, died at the Massachusetts Hospital in Boston, Monday evening, April 3rd, 1916, where she was taken suffering from burns to the lower part of her body.

Mrs. Jenkins was burning rubbish in her yard. Suddenly her clothing became afire. She rushed into the house of Mrs. Thomas Keegan, her next door neighbor, a sheet of flame. Mrs. Keegan endeavored to put out the flames assisted by other neighbors and in doing so, badly burned her own face and hands. The fire department was called to the home of Mr. T. Keegan, for a light fire in the dining room caused from fragment of Mrs. Jenkins clothing falling to the floor and setting fire. First aid treatment was administered until the arrival of Dr. H. M. Grady, who ordered her removed to the hospital. Mrs. Jenkins is survived by her husband and five small children of Dedham, her mother, Mrs. Jos. Arnburg of Wolfville, two brothers, Mr. William Arnburg of Kentville, and Mr. Charles Arnburg of Wolfville, and four sisters, Miss Margaret Arnburg

of Kentville, Mrs. Wilbert Rogers and Miss Janie Arnburg of Wolfville, and Mrs. Allan Mahar of Cambridge. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved ones.

Zeebrugge Bombarded Once More.

London, April 25—An attack on German positions on the Belgian coast by British warships is reported in an Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam. The bombardment is described as one of the heaviest in the region during the war.

The despatch says the following message has been received in Amsterdam from Flushing:

"Several British warships, accompanied by destroyers and other vessels, yesterday, bombarded Zeebrugge and the German batteries off HevstBlankenborghs and Knocke. The bombardment was one of the heaviest since the beginning of the war, and also of the longest duration. The damage done at Zeebrugge is said to have been enormous. The harbor and docks were hit several times and some ships were sunk. British aircraft also threw bombs on German batteries"
